





Series of Lectures to Be Given Vital Force to Our Everyday Life.

Alpha Chi Sigma, honorary chevical fraternity, is inaugurating a set les of lectures on chemistry as a vital force in our everyday life. The lectures will take place once every two weeks and will be given in the main lecture hall of the Chemistry building. The first one will be given next Thursday at 5 o'clock by Dr F. W. Upson, the head of the chemistry department, on the Field of Or gamic Chemistry

"The purpose of the lectures is to show the one who is not a student of chemistry that it is not merely a study of test tubes and abstract principals, but that it is vitally connected with our commercial and industrial life," said Lemont Kier, a member of Alpha Chi Sigma.
