FOR KANSAS CITY**

Cornhusker Tracksters to Compete in Valley Championship Indoor Meet Saturday.

CALIFORNIA MEET NEXT

Coach Schulte and Team of Twenty Men Will Set Out for Coast After Conference Contest.

The following twenty Cornhusker tracksters: Dave Noble, Keith Lloyd, Norris Coats, Louis Trexler, "Red" Layton, Ted Smith, Maurice Gardner, E. V. Allen, Ted Slemmons, Cohen, Lear, Kenner, Duke Gleason, Parks, Hobb Turner, Sed Hartman, "Chick" Hartley, Ike Lukens, Bob Weir, and Crites, will leave at 1:30 today on the Burlington for Kansas City, where they will compete in the Missouri Valley championship indoor meet all day Saturday.

The party is in charge of Coach Henry F. "Indian" Schulte, and manager Herb Gish is accompanying the team. Student Manager Steve King will go with the team to Kansas City, but will return after the Valley meet while the team will set out for the coast over the Southern Pacific Sunday. The team will arrive in Kansas City at 8:30 tomorrow evening.

Advance dope on the Valley meet favors the Kansas University and Husker track teams. Kansas won the meet last year with a five-point margin over Nebraska and the Jayhawkers have considerably strengthened their team since that time. The K. U. team has overwhelmingly strengthened. U. team has overwhelming strength most of her ability concentrated in

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the running events. The odds are decidedly in favor of Kansas, but the Huskers can be relied upon to make a creditable showing.

A number of speed artists will compete in the 50-yard dash at the Coliseum Saturday. Dave Noble and Keith Lloyd, who won the first two places in this event at the K. C. A. C. meet, will represent Nebraska in this event, and are expected to garner their share of the honors. Erwin, Kansas Aggie sensational sprinter, is also expected to make a strong bid for the honors in the sprint events. Fisher and Woestemeyer are Kansas' entries in the dashes.

Coach Karl Schlaademan of Kansas is placing a great deal of confidence in his quartet of special event men: Norton, Poor, Captain Rogers, and Graham. Norton, Jayhawker sophomore phenomenon, won first honors in the individual competition at the Illinois relays, and is expected to go strong in the high jump, broad jump, shotput, and pole vault at the Valley meet. Poor is the high jumper who cleared better than six feet at the Athletic club meet, while Rogers pole vaults regularly in the neighborhood of twelve feet. Graham is showing up well in the hurdles.

For the Huskers Gardner is looked to win a high place in the half mile, which he won last year. Allen broke the tape first in the mile last year, and should repeat again this year, as he is in excellent shape. Coats and Slemmons will also run strong in the distance events. The Nebraska quarter-mile team will probably be composed of Layton, Ted Smith, Trexler, and Crites.

**Suburban Cafeteria
Is Proving Success**

Special dinners, cafeteria breakfasts, and luncheons and dinner with service are some of the attractions that are drawing more and more students to the "Rendezvous" suburban restaurant, operated under the direction of the department of halls and commons of the University of Wisconsin, in Wingra Park, a suburb of Madison, about one mile from the university.

The Rendezvous was started last year because of the need of an eating place so that the students might room in that district and relieve the crowded conditions that were raising rents in the old student quarter. All food is cooked in the central kitchens adjoining Lathrop, Barnard, and Chadbourne halls where the university operates another cafeteria and two dining halls.
