The Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A. are organizations of our campus that are doing the work of the World Christian Student Federation. The members are trying to find the right way of living. The work of these organizations should not be done by those who do it merely as a campus activity. The members of the Y. W. C. A. and of the Y. M. C. A. should work for what they believe to be the best in life and no other consideration should govern their actions.
