HARD WORKOUTS IN STORE FOR HUSKER SQUAD

Battle Put Up by Missouri Upsets Dope Bucket in Valley.

GRID TEAM PREPARES FOR NOTRE DAME GAME

With two weeks before the next game, the Cornhusker warriors have in store the hardest workouts of the season in preparation for the big contest of the season, when the Irish from Notre Dame appear at the Nebraska memorial stadium November 10 to audit their yearly accounts with the fighting Cornhuskers.

The game at Columbia last Saturday gave the Tigers a kick when the Tigers came out of the contest with as many markers in their scoring column as the Cornhuskers. The team that faced the Cornhuskers was, according to the coaches and old timers of Columbia, "a new Missouri team." Never in the history of the school have the Mizzous fought like they did Saturday. It was their big game of the season and they made a good showing.

The question shouldn't be "what was the matter with the Cornhuskers?" but "what happened to Missouri?" The Cornhuskers put a wonderful battle, every man on the team fighting every minute. The breaks of the game halted the Husker attacks. The field was muddy and the ball was wet. There was considerable fumbling on both sides but it just happened that there was a Missourian there when a Nebraska back fumbled.

No one asked the question "what was the matter with Notre Dame?" last year when the Huskers turned in a decisive victory. They all commented on the playing of the Huskers. Every one knows that Notre Dame played its best but that the Cornhuskers were all primed to win. So it is when all the other Valley teams meet Nebraska. They would rather turn in a victory over the Scarlet and Cream than any other team and consequently go in for everything they are worth to turn back the Huskers.

The playing of Dave Noble and the nerve of Captain Lewellen were the outstanding features of the Husker team. When Lewellen intercepted a pass on the Nebraska 30 yard line and ran to a touchdown there was but one opponent between him and a touchdown and Weir removed that obstacle. Lew's arm was in very bad condition but he played the game with a nerve that was unbeatable.

There is no game for this week and all time is being used for strenuous practices. Scrimmages will be held every night with the second squad and with the freshman.

The Michigan Daily was able to have an extra telling of the results of the game at the gates of the football field when the crowd was leaving. Connection by private telephone with the field enabled a picked staff to have the paper off the press within a few minutes of the final whistle and waiting automobiles rushed it to the gates.

At the Utah Agricultural College the Freshmen won in the tug-of-war with the Sophomores, and twice pulled the reluctant upper classmen through the icy stream of water. This is the first time in years the Freshmen have ever accomplished this feat.
