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TWENTY SWIMMERS TRY FOR VARSITY
Prospects for Aquatic Sport Grow Brighter as More Men Report.

Prospects for a good swimming team at Nebraska are growing brighter every day. Sixteen men answered the first call for practice last Monday night, and several more responded during the week. The total turnout is twenty men.

Coach Frank Adkins is planning on six events in the meets that Nebraska enters this winter. He will have men in fancy diving, breast stroke, back stroke, plunging for distance, long distance swim and sprints.

There are seven men competing for berths in the sprints events. Among them are Karl Dimond, Foster Matchet, Donald McAlman, Frank and Jack Hunton. Five men are trying for fancy diving. They are Herbert Ulrich, Frank and Jack Hunton, Paul Popejoy, and L. R. Schildneck. Two candidates for plunging for distance are Bill Abbott and Kenneth Martyn. Dan Reed and Karl Dimond will enter for back stroke swimming, and Graebing and Dan Reed are entered for the breast stroke. Adkins says he has a pair of potential distance swimmers in L. R. Schildneck and L. A. Kirkbride.

The swimming sport is three years old at Nebraska. There were four men on the first team put out by Nebraska, and other teams met that year were the Omaha Athletic club, Kansas Aggies and Ames. The second and third years the squad was increased to five because of a larger turnout. This year there will be from six to ten on the team.

Swimming is an important minor sport in all Big Ten colleges, as well as in all big eastern schools. In the Big Ten circuit there are as many as fifteen men on the squad, with fifty or more candidates. The same is true of the eastern colleges and universities where aquatic sports rival football and basketball in popularity.

Since its organization three years ago the swimming sport has been growing in popularity. At present there are about sixty students registered in the University swimming classes at the Y.M.C.A. The university is handicapped greatly in this sport by the lack of a pool.

COOLIDGE ENDORSES GOLDEN RULE SUNDAY

Day to Be for Benefit of Near East Relief Work.

President Coolidge in a letter made public today by Charles V. Vickery, general secretary of near east relief, endorses the plan for observing December 2 as International Golden Rule Sunday.

Plans for the day, as outlined by a recent international conference in Geneva, call upon people of fourteen different countries to serve a menu in their homes similar to that served in orphanages in the Near East, the difference in cost of the orphanage menu and the ordinary meal to be contributed to orphanage work overseas. The president's letter says:

"It is with a good deal of satisfaction that I commend your proposal to observe an International Golden Rule dinner Sunday, on the second of December, 1923. I feel sure that this suggestion will meet with very widespread approval and will bring more closely to mind the charitable requirements of those who are prosperous to those who are in adversity. It suggests not only a practical method for help, but the highest expression of sympathy, by sharing for a time the privations of others. Cordially yours, "CALVIN COOLIDGE."

Mr. Vickery said that among the notable people abroad, who will cooperate to give the day an international aspect are ex-Premier Clemenceau, Prince Carl of Sweden, Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, Premier Gonatas of Greece, M. Paul Hymans, and Mlle. Alice Masaryk, daughter of the President of Czechoslovakia.

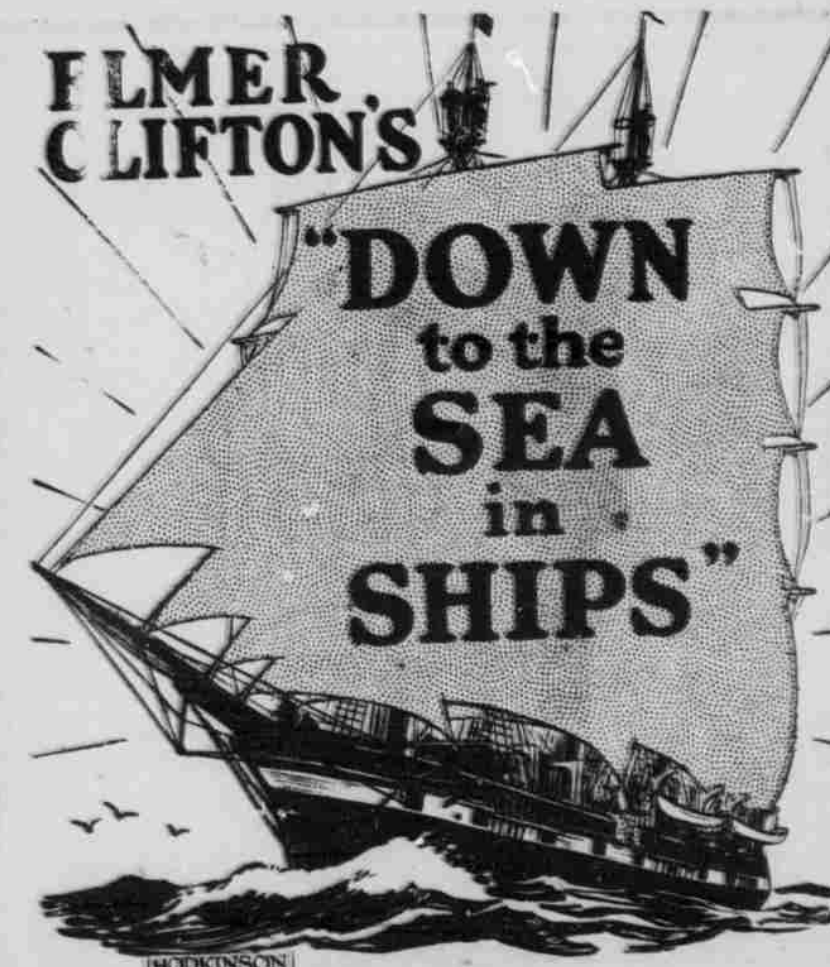
