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**Baseball Prospects Bright for Wildcats**

MANHATTAN, Kan., March 19.—(By M. V. I. N. S.)—Pre-season Kansas Aggie baseball prospects are the brightest in several seasons, in the opinion of Coach C. W. Carsaut, who takes his first position as a valley baseball coach this season.

Unless the pitching staff, which is not overly strong, fails to develop a pair of dependable hurlers, the Wildcats expect to be "up there" or very close when the season closes.

Although a two-foot snow now covers the home plate on the new Aggie diamond, the thirty members of the squad are taking regular workouts indoors and hope to be back out again in a day or so. Eight letter men including two pitchers, Bernard Conroy and Edward Cunningham, are among those receiving uniforms. Although Conroy and Cunningham were the varsity regulars last season, Henry Karns, a sophomore, is the best looking pitcher at present.

Ralph Karns, brother of the twirler, is showing up flashily at shortstop. Burr Swartz, football quarter-

back, is expected to win his third letter on first base, and has Arthur Stark, all-Valley halfback, as a competitor.

Lyle Ernst and L. M. Staley, letter man from last year on second, complete the infield. Captain Gleen Aikins will play the season in left field and N. S. Barth, another veteran, will cover center area. There are several candidates for the right field berth. Conroy, pitcher, will probably play that position if he fans to make good on the mound.

A letter man for the catching job is among those conspicuous by absence, although Carsaut has three promising rookie candidates in A. L. Biehm, W. H. Lutz and D. H. Carter.

No cut will be made in the baseball squad during the season, and Carsaut plans to carry a large road team in order to give the "comers" experience for next year, when most of this season's regulars will be gone.
