LAYTON IS BACK IN-TRACK SQUAD

Husker Chances of Taking Dual Meet With Kansas Take a Jump.

K. U. AND MISSOURI ARE STRONGEST TEAMS

Red Layton, sprinter and hurdler, will be eligible for the Kansas dual meet Thursday at Lawrence, was the good news given the Husker track squad yesterday. With Red Layton back in the lists, Nebraska's prospects of a victory at Lawrence mount considerably.

Outside of Missouri, Kansas University is considered the strongest contender Nebraska will have to face in the coming Missouri Valley track and field championship meet at Lincoln on May 24. A test of strength between Nebraska and the Jayhawkers will be furnished Thursday in the dual meet at Kansas, and Coach "Indian" Schulte's slogan of "Kansas will tax us to the limit" still stands.

The Husker squad for the Kansas meet will be selected some time today by Coach Schulte. The team leaves Wednesday night on the Burlington.

The Kansas meet is Nebraska's first dual meet this year. The other dual meet of the season will be with Kansas Aggies next week at Lincoln.

In the tryouts last Thursday for the Kansas U meet, two new track records were made by the Husker tracksters, and good time was made in the other events. Nebraska will be strongest in the middle distances.

Nebraska will probably take first in the shotput, the half mile, mile, quarter and hurdles. The remaining events will be nip-and-tuck fights, and on them will depend victory for the Husker team.

Men Must File Entries Today at Athletic Office—Play at Country Club.

The men turning in the eight lowest scores will compose the golf squad and these men will play before each match to determine the four members who will make up the team.
