Allow Students to Register in Lincoln

The City Clerk's office was opened from 7 to 9 o'clock last night to enable students, and others who could not be there at the regular hours, to register for the election, November 4.

Students who have registered in their home towns will be compelled to vote there of course, but those who will be in Lincoln forty days prior to the election, are enabled to vote here. Students are not allowed to register by mail in their home towns, but may cast their vote in Lincoln instead.

All registering must be done at the City Clerk's office before October 26, and although only about 12,000 have registered to date, that many more are expected before closing time.
