Max Westermann, assistant secretary of the Board of Regents, died Friday morning. His going was a distinct loss to the University as well as to the city of Lincoln.

Mr. Westermann was associated with the finance office of the University for thirty-five years, and his acquaintance with financial matters extended to the handling of the funds for war-time relief drives in Lincoln. His experience made his services valuable to the University, even if his excellence of personality and character be disregarded.

He was cultured, a gentleman, and a close friend of many University professors. His gentleness and tact made him more than welcome in the homes of his many Lincoln friends on numerous occasions, one of which was the death this summer of Prof. F. W. Sanford, chairman of the department of ancient languages.

The students, many of whom knew him personally, will not soon forget the completeness with which Mr. Westermann exemplified useful citizenship.

THE CHORUS.

The University Chorus again finds itself with an insufficient number of men to add the necessary volume and depth to its offerings.

The chorus is one of the oldest musical organizations at Nebraska. For twenty-eight years this body has kept a custom that may properly be called a Nebraska tradition - the presentation of the oratorio, "The Messiah," just before the Christmas recess. This is the only distinct custom at the University that has any relation to the longest recess of the academic year.

Last year an outdoor concert with the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra was scheduled for the stadium but inclement weather forced the authorities to present the program in the uncomfortably crowled city auditor-

### BUY A TICKET.

Student athletic tickets will go on sale early Monday morning. Every student who feels himself a University citizen should buy one as soon as possible after the sale opens. The importance of promptness cannot be over-stressed.

The abandonment of the active campus campaign this year makes it imperative that every student realize the necessity of his buying a ticket Monday. The success of the entire sales will probably hinge upon the showing made on the first day, and the department of athletics hts nothing to depend upon beyond the initiative of the individual student in making the first day a big one.

It should require no explanation to the three upper classes that the whole fabric of the Cornhusker world of athletics depends upon the successful sale of the student tickets. If the athletic officials have less money than they had last year they can hardly be expected to turn out as good teams, for the success of a team depends not only upon the excellence of its training, but also upon the thoroughness of training and availability of the best equipment. Thoroughness of training can only be secured with an extensive coaching staff, which could not be main-tained if the funds available this

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
