Nebraska Men Correct Acoustic Properties at State House.

Ellis, superintendent of buildings, R. R. Saxson, assistant purchasing agent, and John Gunnarson, foreman of the woodworking department. Large curtains were strung below the west balcony and a deflector was placed above the speaker's desk. R. A. Cushman of the University's broadcasting station installed electrical amplifying devices.
