

### COEDS FIRE BEST SCORE OF SEASON

Lawless Stands High in Past Week; Makes Points Prone and Sitting.

The University of Nebraska women's rifle team fired its best record targets of the year last week. The women's total ten-member score in the prone and sitting position was 1797, an improvement of 39 points over the previous high score for these positions. In the prone position the co-ed improved their score 17 points, raising their former high mark of 927 to 945.

The best co-ed marksman for the week was Isabelle Lawless who made a score of 192 in the prone and sitting positions. She also led in the prone firing where she was tied with G. Foster, both making a score of 98. D. M. Abbott was second in both the prone, and the prone and sitting firing. She made 189 in the prone and sitting positions, and 97 in the prone position.

K. Kidwell and K. Jensen tied for third place in the prone shooting, both making 96. Marie Hermank, making 95, was fourth in the prone.

The shooting in the prone position was against the University of Oregon, and the University of Wisconsin. In the prone and sitting position, the match was with the Oregon Agricultural College.
