

# MAT MEET PROGRESSES

First and Second Rounds Run off; Entries Few, but Wrestling Good.

## MOST OF FINALS WILL COME THIS AFTERNOON

The first and second rounds of the numeral wrestling meet were held yesterday afternoon at the Armory. On account of the few entries in the 115, 125, and 175-pound classes, the final bouts in the named divisions were held at the same time. All other finals will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The admission will be free.

Although the number of entries in this meet was far below those in the interfraternity bouts, the contestants displayed better wrestling. The numeral feet was featured by good wrestling in every bout.

## RED TEAM WINS IN TRI-COLOR TOURNAY

Numeral Men Who Have Not Taken Part in Regular Contests Compete.

The Red team captured first honors in the tri-color track meet held on the outdoor track at the stadium Tuesday afternoon. The teams were composed of numeral men who have not taken part in any regular meets.

McCartney, member of the White team, won the mile event in 4:42 3-10. Reller was second and Kelly of the Blue team placed third. Roberts of the Red team won the 880-yard run in two minutes and 5-10

seconds. Davenport placed second, and Tappan, both of the White team, third. H. L. Johnson of the White team ran the 440 in 54 5-10 seconds. In the 220-yard run Wyatt took first place for the Blue team in 23 1-10 seconds. Davenport placed second with 23 2-10 seconds.

In the broad-jump, Gish leaped 21 feet, 3 1-2 inches, taking first for the Reds. Hulsker, member of the Blue team, was second with a jump of 20 feet, 9 1-2 inches; while Davenport of the White and Fleming of the Blue team tied for third place with 20 feet and 9 inches.

Fleming of the Blues ran the 110-yard high hurdles in 16 8-10 seconds. In the 110-yard low hurdles, Gish of the Red team won in 13 seconds. Leffler, also of the Reds, placed second, and Fleming third.

## Final Battalion Parade Is Tonight

The final battalion parade of the week will be held this evening at 5 o'clock on the drill field. The Third Battalion, comprising companies H, I, K and L will parade, and all cadets in this battalion are required to be present in uniform. These parades are the first since the regimental parade held on Armistice Day.

## LINE STRONG IN PRACTICE

Defensive Gridsters Allow Few Gains; Hutchinson at Center Is Mainstay.

### BEARG GIVES WORK ON NEW SHIFT-PLAY

Coach Bearg's defensive line held well yesterday in the daily scrimmage, and only a few gains were made through the White line by the Red offensive backs. Presnell was the only Red back who made any big gains. The other backfield men were able to make only short gains, and sometimes were set back for short losses by Hutchinson at center on the defensive line. There were many fumbles, partly on account of the light rain, which made the ball slippery.

The practice was held on the green at the north end of the field, while the south practice field was plowed. The scrimmage started with a few plays involving the new shift Bearg has been drilling on this week. The offensive was unable to make

much headway with these plays. Later in the scrimmage Bearg ordered the old line of plays, but they were no more successful in gaining through the White line than the other set of plays.

### White's Outcharge Offense

It was a case of the White set of line men and backfield men outcharging the Reds and breaking through to spoil the plays in their formation. Hutchinson, varsity letter-man, was the mainstay of the White line, playing center. He was well supported by James and Bass at guard, Casey at tackle, and Dover at end. "Hutch" broke through several times to tackle the Red backs behind the line of scrimmage.

Presnell was the lone Red backfield man who made gains of any consequence through the White line. Once he got past the secondary line of defence on a run which would have resulted in forty or fifty yards of gain in a game. "Jug" Brown was unable to make his usual gains, being tackled right near the line of scrimmage. This was partly due, however, to an offensive line that failed to match the defensive, and did not block properly.

### Built Around Center

The defensive line was built up around Hutchinson at center. Bass and James were guards, Casey and Douglass, tackles, Dover and Lawson,

ends. In the backfield were Peaker, Decker, Shaner, and Shostak.

On the offensive team, Stevens was quarter, Oelrich full, "Jug" Brown wing back, and Presnell tail back. In the line were Grow at center, Zuber and Stiner, guards, Randels and Ralsch, tackles, Sprague and McIntyre, ends.
