"The coming of the Slavic nations on the world's stage is the remarkable phenomenon of the age," stated Boris V. Morkovin, professor of Russian language at the Charles University at Sprague, Czechoslovakia, at a convocation for Fine Arts students in the Temple theater yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

"The history of Bohemia is very fascinating and interesting," were the first words Mr. Morkovin uttered. He said that the audience could judge for itself the beauty and quaintness of the cities in the slides which he would use.
