Many Riding and Roping Contests Are on Program for Farmers' Fair

The Wild West committee has an-
nounced that preparations are com-
plete for their big show, to be given
at the Farmer's Fair, Saturday.

The following prizes will be award-
ed for the various riding and roping
contests: a Stetson hat, donated by
Farquhar's clothing company, for
the best bucking horse rider; a silk
shirt to the champion steer rider, do-
nated by Mayer Brothers; a slip-over
sweater, donated by Ben Simon and
Sons, for the champion bare-back
rider; and Red Long of the College
Book Store will give five dollars in
trade to the best calf roper. The
judges of the contests will be F. H.
Beaumont, John Munn, and Earnest
Folsom. All of these men are ex-
perienced horsemen and should prove
to be competent judges.

Anyone is eligible to enter the con-
tests and a number of students in
the University will ride, as well as
several men from out in the state.
Some of the students who have en-
tered are Oscar Yoder, Mark Hirsig,
Glen Curtis, Pearly Wyatt, Miles Mc-
Cullough and Watson Foster.
"Chuck" Woodrum, Burwell, Neb.,
and Julius Anderson of Rosebud, S.
D., both experienced riders, have also
signed up for the contests.

Mark Hirsig of Cheyenne, Wyo.,
will put on an original mounted quad-
rille in which eight men and eight
women will take part. Mr. Hirsig
will use his own horses for this event
and the riders will be members of
some of his riding classes. Mr. Hir-
sig will also give riding and roping
demonstrations and will exhibit the
tricks of some of his trained horses.

The horses that have been secured
by the committee this year are of a
better quality for this type of show
than those that have been used in any
previous Fair. "High Moon," one of
the bucking horses, has never been
ridden and has been used in Wild
West shows in all parts of the state.
"I-Be-Damn," another of the buck-
ing horses, has the reputation of hav-
ing thrown every rider who has ever
mounted him. Names of some of the
other more notorious horses are:
"The Wahoo Wasp," "Hard Hearted
Hannah," and "Appendicitis."

The steers and mules are of a very
vicious nature and will give even the
experienced riders much difficulty.
It should be worth coming to the
Farmers' Fair to see the Wild West
show alone, regardless of the many
other attractions. The Wild West
show will be held at the east part of
the campus at 2 o'clock. Guide books
and the barkers will direct those at-
tending.
