### NEW CIVIL SERVICE OPENINGS

#### Seven Positions Open to Students At Government Work

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for positions that are of interest to students wishing to enter government work. Some of these positions are: investigator in business administration, salary \$3000; assistant investigator in business administration, salary \$2400; assistant chemist and dietitian and junior librarian, salary \$1860-\$2400; library assistant, salary \$1680-\$2040; junior home economics specialist, entrance salary \$1860.

Applicants for the position of investigator must have been graduated from a college or university with 118 credit hours including 15 semester hours in political science, economics, business administration or industrial engineering or a combination of these subjects aggregating 15 semester hours. Experience in the investigation of business establishments is necessary. For the position of assistant investigator applicants must show that they have had at least two year's college training and experience in accounting work or in the investigation of business establishments. Competitors for these positions will not be required to report for examinations at any place but the applicant's publications or a thesis must be submitted. Receipt of applications for these offices will close June 2.

Applicants for the position of assistant chemist must have a bachelor's degree with 30 hours in chemistry. Experience in work of a technical character is required but graduate work will be accepted in lieu of this. The closing date for the receipt of applications is June 15. Competitors for the position of dietitian will be rated on education, training, and experience on a scale of 100 without examination. Applications will be received until June 30.

The examinations for Librarians and Junior Home Economics Specialist will be held in Lincoln. Applications for the Librarian vacancies will be received not later than May 29 and those for the home economics position not later than June 13. Applicants for Junior Home Economics Specialist must have a degree and submit a thesis on the results of some original investigation or an work done in collecting and arranging facts and in drawing proper deductions from these facts. The thesis should bear upon textile and clothing problems.

Those wishing full information regarding the requisites for these positions and the time of examinations should apply to the local post office, to the U. S. Civil Service Board or to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.
