**PLAN AG COLLEGE MIXER THIS WEEK**

Ag Club in Charge of First Mixer of Year—To Be Held in Home Economics Building.

**DAIRY JUDGING TEAM FOURTH AT CONTEST**

Junior Nebraska Team Competes With Best Colleges of Middle West at Dairy Congress.

The University of Nebraska junior dairy cattle judging team placed fourth at the Waterloo Dairy Cattle Congress contest yesterday, according to a dispatch from Coach Ray F. Morgan. Iowa State College won the contest, Wisconsin was second and South Dakota third.

All other teams in the contest were the best the other colleges could send into competition while Nebraska men are underclassmen who have another year of training before they can make the senior or crack dairy judging team, says Prof. H. P. Davis of the agricultural college dairy department.

**Plants and Vines Show Mobility Under Camera**

That plants and vines are mobile in their ways just as animals are, that they show almost human characteristics in their movements is a fact revealed by a motion picture made by Dr. Francis Long of the Tucson, Ariz., desert laboratory of Carnegie institute.

Dr. Long's researches are made with motion picture cameras which speed up the movements of a common twining plant such as the morning glory 19,200 times.

When such a picture is flashed on the screen, the movement of the plant in search of more sunlight appear similar to muscular contractions.
