Was Once Regent Of University Of Washington; Holds Honorary Degree.

IS SEATTLE ATTORNEY

Assisted United States In Alaska Boundary Dispute With Great Britain Commission.

Students of the University of Nebraska will hear one of the most prominent political leaders and attorneys on the Pacific coast when John P. Hartman, ex-'80, Honorary LL. M. '08, speaks on "The Constitution" at a University College of Law convocation Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Hartman has been actively interested in political work for many years although he has held but one public office—Regent of the University of Washington.

He contributed much advice to the United States commission which was successful in the Alaskan Boundary dispute between the United States and Great Britain.

In 1876, Mr. Hartman entered the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, but left in 1881 after completing the work of his junior year, but not having been graduated.

The University of Nebraska conferred an honorary degree of Master of Laws upon him in 1908.

He was admitted to the practice of law in November, 1883, and continued his professional work in Nebraska for seven years, being one of the attorneys for the Union Pacific railway.
