Some men might "spike," or agree to later pledge, a fraternity. That, however, would be to their own disadvantage, as they would lose their chance for unmolested decision.

The ordinary method of accepting bids where delayed pledging is used is for the rushee to appear at dinner on a designated evening. If he has not made a decision he may wait until later to pledge. Freshmen who break pledges might be prohibited from pledging another fraternity for a semester, for no claim of insufficient time for consideration or of "high pressure" methods would be

It might be well to initiate early in the second year. This plan would weed out the men who come to school for a semester or a year, merely to "make" a fraternity, and it would bring more men back to school.

There may be many faults in this plan; it may be unsuitable, but that some form of delayed pledging would be valuable we strongly contend. At least it will serve as a basis for discussion and it may bring forth some much better system.


