## MAKE EXPERIMENT WITH PIGS

Nebraska Experiment Station Re-  
ceives 170 From Government  
Farms in South Dakota.

The Nebraska Experiment Station recently received 170 spring pigs from the government experiment farms at Newell and Ardmore, South Dakota to be used in a fattening experiment, testing the efficiency of protein supplements and different systems of feeding.

These pigs were farrowed at these two farms and were used in a project on the production of feeder pigs. They will be fattened at the

Experiment Station under the directions of the animal husbandry department and marketed in Omaha. Slaughter and shipping data will be secured to be used as a part of both trials.

The experiment will include ten lots, using different supplements with corn. Self-feeding, and hand-feeding will be compared. Another part of the trial will be a test on the efficiency of pigs from old sows as compared with pigs from young sows.
