Students Will Stage Pep Meeting On Night Before Washington Game.

WILL PREPARE FOR GAME

Nebraska Fights For First Time This Year On Their Own Football Field

Nebraska's first home game rally will be held Friday night at 7 o'clock in preparation for the Saturday game with the University of Washington.

Varsity cheer leaders and the University band will help stir the Husker enthusiasm. A complete schedule of events has not been made.

Washington will be one of the hardest games of the Cornhusker schedule and at least 3000 students are expected at the rally.

Coach Bearg said yesterday that he was very much pleased at the idea of a rally for each of the home games.

This will be Nebraska's first game with Washington and there is no record of past victories or defeats to go by.

REPORTED AT VESPERS

"Girls are just girls, whether they are in college or in the factory" is the message brought to University women at Vespers Tuesday night.
