

### HAWKS PRIME FOR WISCONSIN GAME

Nick Kutsch Determined to Show His Metal in Contest with Badger Squad

IOWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 4.—With sharpened spurs and a grim determination to prove to the world that Iowa has a football player or two as well as Illinois, Cowboy Kutsch is getting ready to ride through the Badgers Saturday. Wisconsin is going to have eleven stubborn obstacles in Nick's path and he may find the going tough, but he is going to ride and ride hard.

Coach Burton A. Ingwerson is preparing two kinds of attacks for the invading Badgers. There will be a "Wet" combination of Fry, Schirmer, Dauber, and Cuhel, and the "Dry" will have Kutsch, Schirmer, Graham, and Fry. Wisconsin will put up a stiff fight that is cut and dried, and the Hawks are going to be

ready for them.

#### Stress Passing Game

The practice this afternoon was long and hard and slippery but the aerial work was stressed nevertheless. The freshmen tried every brand of pass against the Varsity, some of which were successful, and more were not. The Badgers' best bet will be a lot of passes—the more then better and Coach Ingwerson knows this as well as Coach Little of Wisconsin does.

All of the men are in good shape after the Wabash game, and everything should be ready to provide an interesting afternoon for Wisconsin and 25,000 spectators.

This will be the eighth meeting of the teams, and Iowa has only scored one victory to her credit. Last year Captain Parkin saw red, and Wisconsin thought they were seeing Red, with the result that Iowa left that evening with a neat 21 to 7 win.

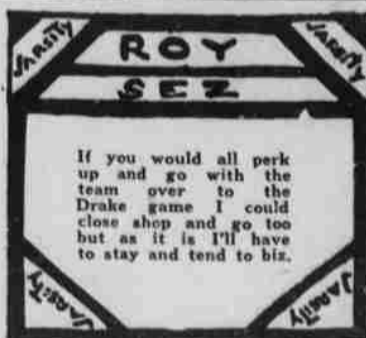

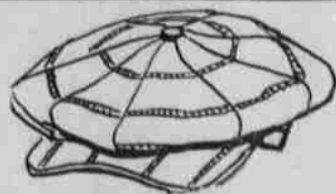
