Delegates from Four Chapters of Senior Honor Society Hold Two-Day Session here

Mortar Board, national honorary society for senior women in universities and colleges, held a district conference Saturday in Ellen Smith Hall with the members of Black Masque chapter at Nebraska as hostesses. The meeting continues today.

Phi Tau Epsilon was established here May 9, 1921, as a local fraternity and has been active on the campus since.
