PRIZE STEER TAKES ADDITIONAL HONORS

College Kenyon, Recent Grand Champion, Also Has Grand Champion Carcass

College Kenyon, grand champion steer at the National Western Livestock Show at Denver, Colorado, and owned by the University of Nebraska, also had the grand champion carcass.

It sold for one dollar per pound, and was bought by the Colorado & Southern Railroad Company. It weighed 1190 pounds. It won the \$300 cash prize offered for the Grand Champion carcass at the show.

This is the fifth consecutive year the University of Nebraska has had the Grand Champion carcass at the National Western Livestock Show, and it is rather uncommon for an Aberdeen Angus steer to win such high honors there.
