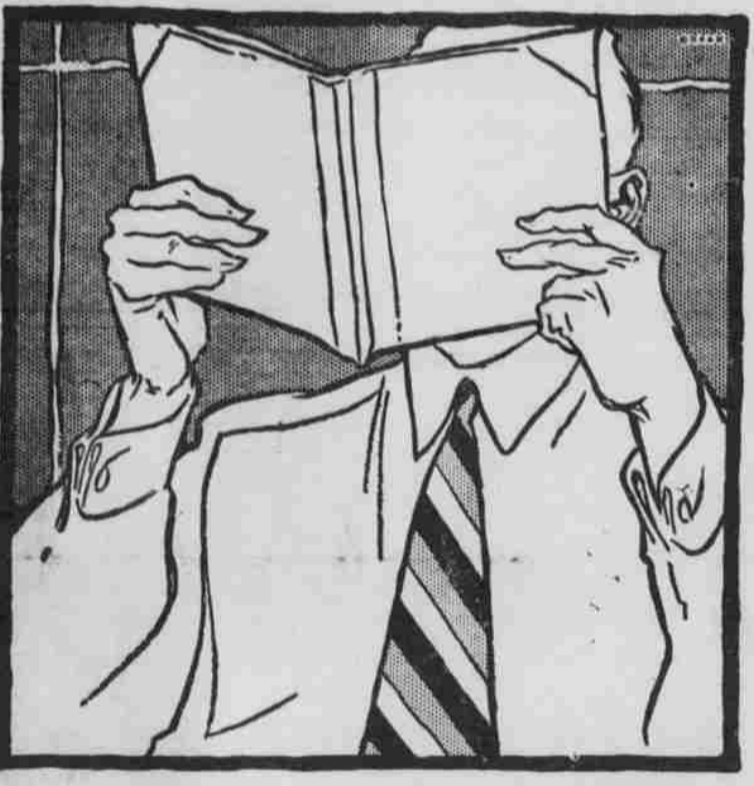

Gridsters Talked To Between Halves

 successful use, works out in his mind the defensive line-up to meet the play and in the period between halves points out to the players how to stop the play.
 A yard's difference in an opponent's defensive line makes a lot of difference in the success of a play. A tackle may be playing close-in or he may be playing wide. The center may be roving behind the line of scrimmage or an end may be slicing through rather than coming straight across the line. These factors may mean that a hole can be opened in one spot, that a play will not work in another, that an end may be boxed out of a play or that end runs will not be successful. This, the quarterback sizes up as he stands there directing the play to the spot which will make the play most successful. It often happens that a quarterback does not see one little thing in the opposing team which may spell success or defeat for his own team. The coach may see the weakness and show the quarterback the play that will take advantage of that weakness. A good example of this was in the Kansas-Nebraska game this year. Coach Bearg pointed out that a certain line plunge was bound to be successful because of the defensive which the opposition offered. And so it proved,

in the final quarter of the game, by the use of this play augmented by one or two end runs, Nebraska marched down the field twice to score touchdowns on the bewildered Jay Hawks.
 The mistakes and good playing of individual players comes in for its share of comment. The pairing of two players on an especially aggressive line-man, the filling up of a hole in the line by another player when a guard is drawn out for interference, these and many other minor points are calmly calculated while the spectators move in even rhythm to the band, or are urged to violent frenzy by the cheerleaders.
 The winning element—spirit and determination are worked up to the highest point just before the team takes the field. The plea of some alumnus who has given his all in times past for Nebraska's football history, such men as Monte Munn, or Hutchison or Rhodes or one of numerous others, their plea hits home and the team with tears in their eyes take the field. The crowd cheers but the Nebraska Cornhuskers do not hear; their minds are concentrated

on fighting, fighting for Nebraska U. Football games are often won or lost by what happens in the dressing room between the halves.
