

MATMEN DRILL FOR CONTESTS

Annual Inter-fraternity Tournament to be Held About December 8 and 9

The annual University Inter-fraternity Wrestling Tournament will be held about December 8 and 9 in the Coliseum. Competition for first honors is unusually keen this year due to the fact that there will be quite a number of men in it, and that there are several places on the varsity team which will be given to those who show up best in such contests. From last year's team only Lundy, 175 pounds; Karrer, 125; and Luff, 135, are back.

Places are open for men of 108, 115, 145, 158 pounds, and heavy weight class.

Only Valley Schools

The schedule for this year's varsity meet will include probably only Missouri Valley schools and will be arranged at the meeting of the representatives in December. Last year Nebraska men met Kansas Agricultural School, Kansas State University, Missouri State, Ames Agricultural, and Iowa State University. The meet was held at Stillwater.

Dr. Capp, Professor of Physical Education, is in charge of the instruction and he has Kellog, Swindel, and Oakes as active coaches. There are three mats available at all times for any who wish to use them.

CYCLONES FEATURE TWO DOPE UPSETS

Iowa State Harriers Capture Valley Championship; Gridmen Defeat Kaggies, 3 to 2 Saturday

Ames, Iowa, Nov. 23.—Special: Two dope upsets in one day, with a Missouri Valley cross-country championship attached to one of the surprises, was Iowa State's athletic achievement Saturday.

Although the Cyclones were prepared to give everything they had to regain the lost conference harrier championship, they were given but an outside chance to win from the Kansas Aggie team, champions of the Valley for the past two years, and running a team of five-mile men with three years experience. The fact that Captain Conger, Cyclone runner, came in first, to establish the new Missouri Valley record of 25:52 for the five mile grind, won the championship for Iowa State. Hoak, running his first year for the Cyclones, finished fourth, while Christenson, Thompson and Cervi finished eleventh, twelfth and thirteenth for Iowa State.

Regain Honors

While the cross country team was regaining the harrier honors of the Missouri Valley held by Iowa State from 1914 to 1924 the Cyclone football team pulled another of its dope upsets, defeating the Kansas Aggies, 3 to 2, before starting coast-ward for the intersectional battle with the University of California (southern branch) in Los Angeles November 27. The football team as well as the cross-country team was picked as the underdog, and Kansas State on both occasions was the victim of the Cyclones. The Cyclone football team will workout Wednesday, and Thursday at Tucson, Ariz., on the University of Arizona field, before going to Los Angeles.

New York University has the champion collegiate chess team of the United States, with victories over Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and West Point.

COLLEGE MEN TO HOLD DISCUSSION

Fraternity Delegates to Consider Educational and Social Questions at New York Meeting

New York, Nov. 23.—College fraternity men, many of whom have attained prominence in various walks of life since their undergraduate days, will meet at the Hotel Pennsylvania here this week under the auspices of the Interfraternity Conference for a mutual discussion of educational and social problems. More than 200 delegates from nearly all the national fraternities of the United States and Canada will meet for sessions Friday and Saturday.

With the fraternity officials will meet two score of educators, college

presidents and deans from all parts of the country, invited to the conference by its educational advisor, Dean Thomas Arkie Clark of the University of Illinois. Among the college presidents will be Dr. William Mather Lewis of George Washington University, who will make the chief address of the Conference.

While institutions from every section of the country will be represented among the delegates to the Conference, Cornell leads the list with a total of twenty-two. Pennsylvania representatives are second in number with 19. Columbia will have 18 representatives present, Illinois 16, and New York University 12. Each fraternity, from Acacia to Zeta Psi, will have five representatives.
