He came to Nebraska in 1921 and for three years he put Nebraska football teams on the gridiron that ranked among the best in the country.

Succeeding Coach Dawson was Ernest E. Bearg, who came to Nebraska from Illinois, where he was assistant to the University of Illinois mentor Bob Zuppke. While at Illinois Bearg had charge of the Illini backfield, coaching the famous "Red" gridirons.
