

GRIDMEN POINT FOR SYRACUSE

Bearg Brings Back Valuable "Dope" from the Orange Eleven Camp

GAME WILL BE A THRILLER

Football practice in the Cornhusker camp was resumed again last night on stadium field after three days of rest cure for Coach Bearg's moleskin warriors. Bearg returned from Syracuse with an abundance of valuable football dope for his men. Line Coach "Bunny" Oakes, who scouted the Pittsburgh Panthers in action was instilling some eastern football ideas into the Husker line-men during the workout last night. Passing again received the important place in the practice session. Bearg started out the Husker ball luggers with an entirely new assortment of forward passing combina-

tions in both the offensive and defensive side of the game. Intensive secret practice work will be kept up all week in preparation for the Syracuse Orange eleven.

Bearg Says Game Will Be Thriller
Coach Bearg came back from the stronghold of Coach Andreas' Orange eleven with the report that the Syracuse-Nebraska game will be a thriller from the opening whistle until the final gun makes the inter-sectional clash history. It will be the first test for the Nebraskans in inter-sectional games this season and will be followed by two more, the last to be played with the New York Violets on Thanksgiving day.

"Dutch" Witte, Captain "Jug" Brown and "Blue" Howell, three Husker backs were on the heaving end last night in the practice session and Presnell, Lewandowski, Still, Sprague and Witte on the receiving end. The Syracuse aerial game is a fast one, according to Coach Bearg and it will be this phase of the game that the Husker mentor will drill his football eleven to stop in next Saturday's game.

Syracuse Has Good Running Attack
The Orange eleven also has a good running attack and Oakes was giving his 194-pound Nebraska line some pointers on the Syracuse attack through the line. Three days of this week will be spent in three of

the hardest days of training the Nebraskans have received this year.

The three days of rest the Husker moleskin warriors received is the split of the season. Practice will now take on an atmosphere of long workouts until the close of the pigskin season. Nebraska has three inter-sectional games on the card for the remainder of the 1927 season and two Missouri Valley games, all of which will be tough battles for the Nebraska Huskers. Kansas and Kansas Aggies are the two remaining valley schools to be met by the Scarlet eleven.

Kansas Aggies demonstrated their prowess by downing the strong Oklahoma Sooner eleven last week and Kansas held the Washington eleven to a 21 to 21 tie. The Jayhawker team although not considered a strong eleven is in the habit of springing surprises every year and last year was no exception when the Cappon crew took the Oklahoma Sooners into camp.

Penn State Defeats Syracuse
Syracuse's winning streak was halted last Saturday when the Penn State eleven took the long end of the 9 to 6 count. But the score does not indicate the class of performance the Orange eleven displayed. When the final gun ended the game Coach Andreas' eleven had the oval on the five yard line and three downs to make the winning touchdown. Captain Barbuti, Orange fullback and mainstay of the Orange backfield was not playing in this game on account of an injured knee but is expected to be in shape for the Nebraska game on stadium field this Saturday.

Nebraska will have a slight weight advantage on the Syracuse eleven but the weight advantage in this day of football means very little if the team is well coached as the Syracuse team is. Captain Barbuti tips the scales around 190 pounds and is a fast back on end runs and has

a powerful drive through the enemy's line. Baysinger, Orange quarterback is the main offensive cog and handles the forward passing. He is the equal of the Missouri captain, Flamank, and picks his man to receive the pass with sureness. Coach Bearg's version of the flashy quarterback is that he is one of the best field generals that he has seen this year. Baysinger is a triple-threat man, passing, punting and carrying the ball in veteran style.

The dad's day game this Saturday is booked to be a thriller and one of the best on the home field this year. Nebraska is pointing for this Orange crew that has downed its Husker football teams three times in the past. The last time the two elevens met on the gridiron was in 1922 when the Scarlet eleven suffered a 9 to 6 defeat at the hands of the eastern team.

Practice was taken up on stadium field last night for the first time since last Thursday, Coach Bearg giving his Scarlet warriors a three-day rest. Passing and the running attack were given the prominent place in the session. The usual Monday night skull practice was forgotten and Bearg started out his oval luggers for three days of the hardest grind this season all in preparation for the Orange eleven that will invade the Cornhusker camp Saturday. Assortments of passing attacks were used and Bearg will point his squad to the perfected aerial attack that the Syracuse eleven has developed. "Baysinger, the Syracuse quarterback, is one of the best field generals I have seen this year," said the Husker mentor after he returned from the eastern school. Baysinger passes, punts, and runs with ease of a veteran. He rivals the Missouri ace, Clark.

Last week's games in the Missouri Valley made some difference in the conference standing as far as Ne-

braska is concerned as the Husker eleven was idle. Nebraska was in second place last week but Drake had not met any valley eleven and opened the season Saturday by trimming Grinnell to put the Bulldog eleven in a tie for first place with Missouri.

The Southern Methodist University-Missouri game at Dallas last Saturday put three of Coach Gwinn Henry's football stars on the injury list. Captain Flamank, who was inserted into the game in an attempt to stem the Mustang eleven, sprained his hand and the Tiger quarterback, Clark came limping out of the game with an injured knee. Tuttle who did not make the trip to Texas is still nursing a broken hand. The three Tiger stars will probably be sitting together on the bench again when the Missouri eleven takes on Northwestern at Chicago this Saturday. This will be the fifth Missouri Valley-Big Ten clash this season and two of the Valley schools have given good account of the games. Oklahoma Aggies and Kansas were the only schools that failed to make a fair showing against the Big Ten elevens. Oklahoma beat Chicago 13 to 7 in the

season opener and Iowa State held the powerful Illini to a tie two weeks ago. Kansas lost a 41 to 0 game to the Wisconsin eleven and the Stillwater Aggies dropped a game to the Minnesota Gophers.
