Cast for Drama of 1890 Small; One Act Christwas Play Will Be Addition on Program



#### Plan Presented

Mr. Kinsey presented a plan framed in the alumni meetings. A chart Educational Worker Will Talk has been compiled which includes questions on house expenditures and charges. The plan is to have each house fill out the questionnaire and return it to the alumni in charge. From this information it is hoped that a standard budget may be produced that may be used by all fraternities on the campus. The scheme includes no obligations by the fraternity and the alumni will act merely in an advisory capacity.

It is pointed out that a strong financial basis is a prime requirement for a strong fraternity.




