

THREE TOURNEY GAMES PLAYED

Five Forfeits Mark Games of Wednesday Night Schedule of Tournament

LARGE SCORES THE RULE

Only three games out of ten scheduled, marked the evening play in the annual basketball tournament last night. Theta Xi came through in the opening game with a victory over Sigma Nu. In the second contest of the evening, Lambda Chi Alpha went down in defeat before the attack of Alpha Gamma Rho. Delta Sigma Phi decisively conquered Tau Kappa Epsilon in the final game.

Theta Xi easily overcame Sigma Nu, 27 to 7, in the opening performance of the evening. The Theta Xi quintet gained an early lead over the opponents and easily held it throughout the entire game. The fast attack of White at center and Svoboda at forward on the Theta Xi team was too much for Sigma Nu, and they soon weakened before the opponents.

Overcoming a 9 to 6 score at the half, the Alpha Gamma Rho team came back strong in the final period to register a 21 to 12 victory over the Lambda Chi Alpha quintet. The game was a hard fought contest with the outcome in doubt until late in the final period of play when the Alpha Gamma Rho team staged a rally to gain a safe margin over Lambda Chi Alpha which they held until the final whistle.

Roddy of the Alpha Gamma Rho team was the stellar performer of the game, and piled up 15 points for his team single handed. Roddy also showed his ability on free throws by chalking up five points from fouls. Sharp, holding down a berth at center, started for the Lam Chis and was second in individual scoring with 10 points.

Delta Sigma Phi conquered Tau Kappa Epsilon 23 to 5 in the final game of the evening's play. The Delta Sigma Phi team easily broke through the T. K. E. defense and scored frequently during the contest. The T. K. E., although on the short end of a 11 to 1 score at the half, came back stronger in the final period and scored four points against the opponents, but were unable to threaten at any time during the game. Mason at forward on the Delta Sigma Phi quintet started in the game by contributing twelve of the 23 points made by his team. Eno, the lanky Delta Sigma Phi center showed ability in floor work and invariably out-jumped his opponent on the tip off.

STUDENT BODY TO MEET GRID MENTOR

Bill Hargiss, New Football Coach At Kansas University, Looks Jayhawkers Over

Lawrence, Kan., Dec. 14.—Homer W. (Bill) Hargiss, newly appointed head coach of football at the University of Kansas, will be at the University Friday to look over the situation, and it is expected that he will be introduced to students attending the Kansas-Kansas Aggie basketball game.

Hargiss, who is now director of athletics at the Teachers' College at Emporia, is a native of Kansas and a graduate of the Emporia Normal. He has coached football teams for 143 games, of which his teams have won 108, lost 26, and tied 9. In three years that he coached the College of Emporia football team it defeated the Normals twice, and in the next four years, during which Hargiss directed athletics and coached the normals, they defeated the College of Emporia all four times.

In addition to his success as a football coach, Hargiss has developed four outstanding track athletes. John Kuck, under Hargiss' training won the world's records for the 8 and 12-pound shot put, and the intercollegiate record for the 16-pound shot. HIGH SCHOOL RULES SENT BY SECRETARY

Basketball Tourney Will Be March 8, 9, and 10 at Lincoln; Entrance Regulated

Rules for the entrance into the 1928 annual Nebraska high school basketball tournament are listed by Secretary W. J. Braham of the Nebraska High School Athletic Association in a bulletin to high schools.

The bulletin states that the University of Nebraska authorities, board of control, and high school association have sanctioned the following rules regarding the eligibility of teams:

The tournament will be held in Lincoln, March 8, 9, and 10.

The official basketball season shall be between December 12 and February 23 inclusive.

In order to be admitted to the tournament a team must play at least eight regularly scheduled games with member schools within the official season and must win at least fifty percent of all official games played.

No more than two official games shall be played with any one school. If more than two games are played the first two shall be the official games.

All games both within and without the official season must be reported. The complete season's record must be received by the secretary on or before February 29, 1929.

A fact that is to be especially noted that even though the new constitution goes in to effect January 1, 1928, the new eight-semester rule is not effective until September 1, 1928.

Bronze Shield Will Be Offered Outstanding Dakota Co-ed Athlete

Vermillion, S. D., Dec. 14.—A bronze shield engraved with the name of the senior girl chosen as the most outstanding woman athlete, by members of the Women's Athletic Association of the University of South Dakota, will be the reward offered to the most representative girl of the association.

She will be selected from those members receiving red blazers for earning twelve hundred points in sports. Her athletic ability, sportsmanship, and contribution to the work of the association will be considered in the selection, according to Miss Gladys Leonard, professor of physical education for women.
