Dr. Ives Will Lecture On Television Methods

Lawrence, Kan., Febr. 23.—Wonders of the modern understand-

ing of light will be fully explained, and parts of the apparatus used in television will be demonstrated at the University of Kansas March 5 by Herbert E. Ives, director of research for the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., and one of the leading physicists of the world.

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
