With the weather man promising a favorable day, and University of Nebraska's Memorial stadium track and field in shape for any record breaking performers that may compete, the curtain is set to rise on the twenty-first annual Missouri Valley conference track and field championship meet opening this afternoon with the preliminary events, to be followed by the finals Saturday afternoon.

Coach Henry F. Schulte, Husker mentor, his assistants, and members of the coaching classes spent Thursday in rolling. dragging, shoveling, and stamping so that the red cinder oval and runways of Memorial stadium will be in the most advantageous condition for the invading cinder athletes of the ten Missouri Valley schools. The meet will mark the closing battle of the famous and historical Missouri Valley conference.

An informal dinner was held at the chapter house on Thursday evening, and was followed by a program of stunts and songs given by the various groups.






