Elevators for students is not to be the policy followed by the University, according to statement made yesterday afternoon by Dean G. A. Grubb of the College of Dentistry, when questioned about the installation of the first passenger elevator on the Nebraska campus. which is in Andrews Hall.

The elevator serves only the

third floor of the building, in which the clinic of the College of Dentistry is located, and there is no entrance to it on the second floor, The elevator was installed for the purpose of serving the patients of clinic and all others are for bidden the use of it. At the entrances of the elevator, on both the first and third floors, there is posted a notice signed by Dean Grubb to the effect that the ele-vator is for the use of patients.

The elevator is both a passenger and freight elevator, being constructed so that it may be used in both capacities. Supplies for the dental clinic, many of which are exceedingly heavy and bunglesome are transported to the top floor in the elevator.
