Enrollment of Freshmen Is Halted at Ninety-Eight; Over 500 Apply

FACULTY HAS CHANGES

The University of Nebraska College of Medicine in Omana opens Monday. September 24. Registraion was held Friday and Saturday. From more than 500 applications only 96 freshmen were admitted to college. Juniors and seniors were also refused admittance be cause the aiready large classes tax the teaching facilities, according to Dean J. Jay Keegan. There were 314 students in the College of Medcine in 1927-28.

There are no significant changes in curriculum this year, Dean Keegan announced, but the extensive changes of last year will be put into complete operation. It is planned that junior students will be assigned earlier to hospital clinical work, that there will be an increase of out-patient teaching for seniors, a reduction in required didactic periods, an increase in elective courses, and the institution of general committee examinations at the end of the senior year in place tively. of course examinations.

Because of the summer school work offered by the College of Medicine, 35 senior students will be able to graduate next February instead of in June. The summer term was seventeen weeks long. Scholarship standings for last year were announced by Dean Kee gan as follows:

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
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
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
