The University Extension department, situated in the former museum, is being prepared for the students who will undertake the evening courses. The classes will begin on October 1 to 6. Residence credit is given all courses, but some may be carried without credit.

DEANS SEND LETTER OF EXPLANATION TO PARENTS OF ALL NEW REGISTRANTS

In an effort to establish closer co-operation between university officials and the parents or guardians of students, a form letter has recently been mailed to the homes of all new registrants. The letter was mailed jointly from the offices of Amanda H. Heppner, Dean of Women, and T. J. Thompson, Dean of Student Affairs.

TWO THOUSAND FROSH EXPECTED AT WELCOME

Traditions will administer the Cornhusker oath and explain its significance to the first year class. Copies of the oath have been printed to enable each freshman to have one for himself to be placed in their rooms.

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Such permission allows him to continue on probation; also, whenever a student has accumulated twenty-five credit hours with grades below 70 he may be placed on probation, may have the number of hours for which he may register stipulated and may have his participation in extra-curricular activities curtailed.

The letter closes with an appeal for the confidence and exuberance of youth. They like a good time and it is desirable that they should have it. There is little question that the average student will do better work with a limited amount of wholesome recreation and relaxation.

The deans adopt a policy of neutrality of the fraternity and sorority problem. In regard to this the letter says, "Whether you care to have your son or daughter become a member of one of these groups is a matter you should consider carefully."

On recreation and amusements, one of the greatest problems of university life, the letter says, "The average age of the students entering the university is about eighteen years. Young people of this age are in the financial affairs so that the student will be free to devote all his time to class work during the first semester, at least, is strongly recommended."

The letter also states that the Nebraska Credit company, which handles the credit problem in Lincoln, will be glad to assist the parents in the extending or curtailing of credit to students.

The amount of money for expenses, exclusive of clothing, which is recommended by the deans, ranges from five hundred to seven hundred dollars. The danger of excessively large allowances is also mentioned.

Part of the university rules on scholarship are quoted: "Whenever at the middle or end of any semester a student is making an unsatisfactory scholastic record in two-fifths or more of his hours of registration, he is dropped from the rolls of the university. How-

ever, if there are unusual extenuating circumstances, he may petition the Scholarship Committee for permission to continue his university work.

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Following convocation freshmen men will be able to secure their green caps at Bennet and Flugstad's, across from the campus. Green buttons for the girls may be secured at Rudge and Guenzel's. All freshmen are expected to wear the caps and buttons following the initiation.

These evening courses will be of great advantage to the student who day classes.

Varsity cheer leaders will be on hand to teach the freshman the Cornhusker songs and yells as will the Nebraska university band to aid in the singing. Representatives of the two senior honorary societies will also speak.

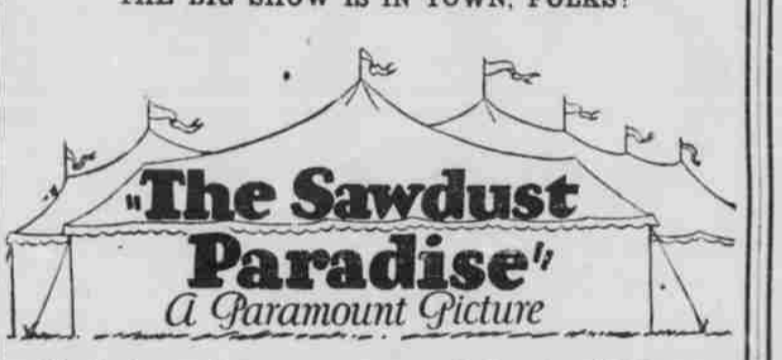
