University Professor Will Give Talk at Fremont This Morning

The 1928 session of the Dodge County City and Rural Teachers' Institute will convene in the high school buildings at Fremont, Nebraska, Friday morning, October 5, at 8:30 o'clock. The institute will continue in session two days, and all persons teaching in Dodge county, or who expect to teach this year, are expected to be present.

Dr. H. C. Koch, of the University of Nebraska Teachers college, will substitute for President Gage, who will be unable to attend the session. Dr. Koch speaks Friday on "The Deficiencies of High School Graduates As Shown by Their Early Work in College."

Dr. W. H. Morton, principal of the Teachers college high school, will also take part in this session, speaking on the problems of the teachers in the high schools, grades, and rural schools.
