Rough Initiations and 'Hell Week' Form Subjects For Debate

NEW YORK-(IP)-"Hell Week" was for a second time condemned the Intrafraternity Conference held at Hotel Pennsylvania here recently.

In a debate on the subject, Lewis D. Syester, Ohio Wesievan senior and member of Phi Kappa Psi, said the abolition of the rough house part of fraternity initiations is expedient because it tends to diminish the prestige of the fraternity system. Serious accidents, he said, are bound to occur. For every 'black eye" the fraternity gives a freshman, he said, it receives two 'black eyes.'

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
