

### Y.W. ISSUES CALL FOR SUMMER APPLICANTS

#### Positions Are Announced for Girls Seeking Vacation Employment

All women students who are interested in summer camp activities at Camp Maqua, Portland, Maine, and at Camp Okoboji, Milford, Iowa, should apply at the offices of the University Y. W. C. A. in Ellen Smith Hall immediately.

The national Y. W. C. A. sponsors these two camps, and carefully selects a group of girls from colleges all over the nation to fill the positions.

While there are some conference groups at the Maine camp, it serves chiefly as a vacation camp for young women. The counselor positions, as well as the openings on the general camp staff, their requirements and their remunerations were described fully in the Daily Nebraskan for Sunday.

Several Jobs at Okoboji. A number of positions are open at Camp Okoboji which is used exclusively by conference groups. Advance information as to positions and requirements for this camp follows:

Workers: Who do general housework averaging six hours daily. These girls must be at least eighteen years of age and physically fit. The remuneration is living, laundry, and \$36.00 for the season.

Office Manager: Who organizes and manages the office and co-operates with conference leaders. Girls of experience and ability will receive living, laundry, and \$125.00 for the entire season.

Stenographers: General stenography and filing, as well as management of the branch post office. The salary is \$70.00 for the season. In addition to living expenses and laundry.

Housekeeper: Superintendency of the camp housekeeping, preferably by person of institutional experience. The wages are \$75.00 for the season.

Dietitian: Who plans and directs the preparation of meals and co-operates with other departments. A graduate home economics student will be paid \$190.00.

Head Swimming Counselor: Organizations of all swimming and water sports and examination of applicants for Red Cross certification. This girl, who will receive \$100.00 for the summer's work in addition to living and laundry, must be a qualified Red Cross Examiner.

Swimming Assistants: Work for physical education majors who

### hold Red Cross Life Saving Certificates.

Store manager: Responsible for the organization and selling of the general supplies. The remuneration is \$60.00.  
Book store manager: Who looks after the sale of Y. W. C. A. technical material, and receives \$40.00 for the season.

### AIRCRAFT COMPANY OFFERS SCHOLARSHIPS

#### Writer of Best Article Will Receive 4-Year Course Or Squipped Plane

To interest more college students in aviation, the Alexander Aircraft Company at Colorado Springs offers a new Alexander Eaglerock airplane or a complete university course in aeronautics for the best series of four short monthly articles on aviation from January 1 to May 1, 1929 written by undergraduate college students.

The winner will be awarded a four-year scholarship in a leading aeronautical engineering school, or in a school of business administration where he can get an aeronautical background. Competing students who receive undergraduate degrees June 1 may win a graduate scholarship in a technical school of aeronautics, leading to a masters' or a professional degree. As an alternative award, the winner may receive a completely equipped Eaglerock airplane.

Articles of superior merit but below winning quality will win their writers 10-hour flying courses. The awards will be made June 1.

The papers, technical or non-technical and 400 to 600 words in length, must be submitted to the committee on awards on the first of each month from January 1 to May 1. Suggested subjects include: "Future Aircraft Development," "Flying for Recreation," "Commercial Possibilities in Aviation," "The Airplane as a Future Decentralizer of Cities," etc.

Candidates will be judged 50 percent on content of their articles, and 50 percent on their qualifications to do justice to the scholarships. The winner, if he qualifies, will be employed in the engineering or some other department of the Alexander Aircraft Company, a magazine with 20,000 circulation among pilots, business executives, and others interested in flying.

### FRESHMEN DEBATE IS SCHEDULED THURSDAY

#### First-Year Students Will Compete for Long Cup December 13.

Freshman debaters will compete for the Long debate cup Thursday, December 13, in Room 101 in Andrews hall, beginning at 8 o'clock. Using the general subject of "Law Enforcement," debaters will be given a half hour in which to prepare the phase of the general topic assigned to them.

An invitation to the public has been extended by Prof. H. A. White, Nebraska debate coach, who, with the Nebraska chapter of Delta Sigma Rho, national forensic society, is conducting the contest.

The name of the winning debater will be inscribed on the cup, which is being donated by E. H. "Red" Long, of the College Book Store. Judging will be on the basis of presentation, thought, knowledge and handling of the subject. Contestants should appear at 7:30, Professor White said.

### WORK IS STARTED ON ESTES PARK COURSES

#### Dr. Pool Announces Plans For Summer Classes In Colorado

Work on the University of Nebraska, held in Rocky Mountain braska summer session courses in National Park, has already been started. Dr. R. J. Pool, of the department of botany, who has charge of the work, announced yesterday. Dates for the session have been set, beginning June 11 and ending July 15. Eleven students have already made reservations.

A number of others have inquired about the course. Each summer since 1926, similar work has been offered. It is of special interest to those who wish to finish their work in this department, and to teachers who have been, or intend to teach botany. It combines six hours of university credit with a helpful vacation under almost ideal conditions.

Held at Camp Olympius. The work is carried on at Camp Olympius, Estes Park, Colo. Dr. Pool, who personally directs the course, has conducted classes and served as guide for several summers, and is familiar with conditions and materials available for such work in Colorado.

The principal course, which is general in scope, will utilize the rich and varied natural resources of the mountain environment to present a broad view of modern biology, with particular reference to flowering plants and forests. The number in this course is limited to thirty.

Advanced Course is Offered. An advanced course is also available to those with considerable training in plant taxonomy or ecology and who will be able to work independently or with minimum guidance. The limit in this course is ten.

Camp Olympius, where the work is centered, is well equipped with new buildings, and occupies one of the finest sites of the park region. The camp faces the Thompson meadows, across which is Long's peak and the Continental Divide.

Early registration is necessary because of the limited accommodations. Reservations will be filled in the order received, and all should be in by May 15. University fees for last year's session were \$16. Other expenses, not including transportation to and from the park, will include, meals and lodging \$87, and transportation with the class in the park, \$25. This makes a total of \$138, not including railroad fare, which is about \$25. A non-resident fee is charged those not from Nebraska.

### CHANCELLOR OFFERS PRIZES FOR ESSAYS

#### Three Best Works Will Be Published; Contest Ends January 8

Chancellor E. A. Burnett is offering three prizes for the best essay on "The Obligations and Rewards of the College Student." The three best works on this subject will be published in a pamphlet and the authors rewarded prizes of twenty-five, fifteen, and ten dollars respectively. The contest closes Jan. 8, the first day after the Christmas holidays.

As stated in last Tuesday's Nebraskan, "the purpose of the contest is to encourage students to a greater appreciation of a college education. The essays are to be approximately one thousand words in length."

Paralleling the student contest, Chancellor Burnett is also conducting a faculty essay contest on "The Obligations and Rewards of the College Professor."

### INTER-GREEK MEETING DISCUSSES PROBLEMS

#### Rough Initiations and 'Hell Week' Form Subjects For Debate

NEW YORK—(AP)—"Hell Week" was for a second time condemned by the Interfraternity Conference held at Hotel Pennsylvania here recently.

In a debate on the subject, Lewis D. Syester, Ohio Wesleyan senior and member of Phi Kappa Psi, said the abolition of the rough house part of fraternity initiations is expedient because it tends to diminish the prestige of the fraternity system. Serious accidents, he said, are bound to occur. For every "black eye" the fraternity gives a freshman, he said, it receives two "black eyes."

"If there were any psychological value of getting the fraternity across by rough methods," he said, "it would have been incorporated long ago. Rough house initiation produces no constructive benefits and seriously undermines the basic spirit of fraternities."

Harold P. Flint, of Lombard, Ill., executive secretary of Tau Kappa Epsilon, characterized the rough house initiation as "an outburst of sadistic temperament." "Some members," he said, "received delight out of inflicting punishment. It would be far better," he said, "for fraternities to stop the rough house practices than wait for the college to abolish them."

The conference accepted an invitation to cooperate with a committee appointed by Dr. H. W. Chase, president of the University of North Carolina, to study college fraternities with a view toward encouraging college administrators to make more use of fraternities as necessary adjuncts to administrations of colleges. Chancellor E. H. Lindley, of the University of Kansas, is chairman of the committee.

### CIVIC BODY ASKS FOR FIRST LYRIC ENTRIES

#### Students Are Requested to Submit Numbers Within Next Few Weeks

Students are urged by the Junior Chamber of Commerce to submit their lyrics for the first section of the Lincoln song contest before Christmas vacation, since no lyrics will be accepted after January 1. Several Prizes Given. After the close of the first section, January 1, three judges will decide upon the winning lyrics. The three best will win prizes of \$25 each. Two hundred and fifty dollars in prizes will be distributed out to the winners of the second section.
