CORNHUSKER TACKLE

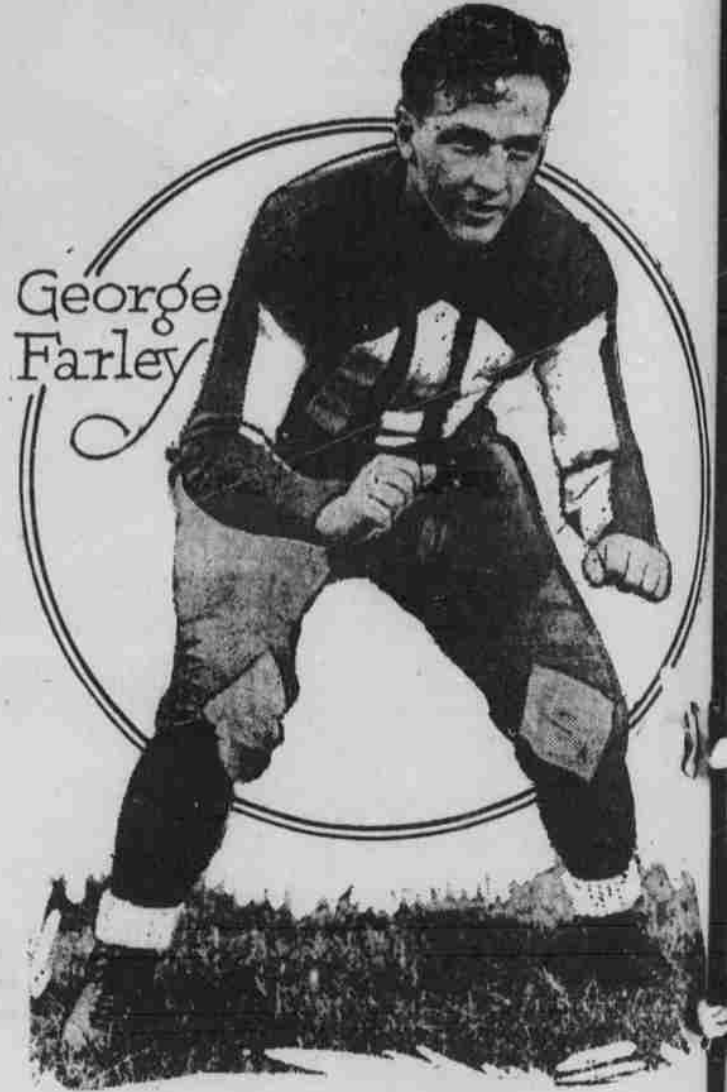
Merton Broadstone, 218-pound Cornhusker tackle, who played his first year with the scarlet-clad Nebraska football team, was selected by many sport writers for a position on the All-Big Six team. He comes to Nebraska from Norfolk and has two more years of varsity competition. Next year, the Husker line will be missing many of its stellar players of this season, and it is around men like Broadstone that the new football coach will have to turn out a Husker line. Broadstone, Richards and Munn are the Husker tackles who will be back for the 1929 grid season.



Glenn Munn

TALL HUSKER TACKLE

Glenn Munn, the tallest man on the Husker squad, plays the tackle position and is one of the foremost in the Big Six conference. He has two years of experience on the Nebraska eleven and next year he will be back to give the new sophomores some competition for that position on the squad. Munn weighs in at 216 and towers up in the air around six foot six. His work this season was outstanding in the defensive play. Many times during the year the tall boy broke through the line to throw the ball lugger for losses.



George Farley

CORNHUSKER HALFBACK

George Farley, one of the greatest defensive backs on stopping the passing attack that wears the Nebraska colors on the sod. Farley has had two years of experience on the Nebraska team and plays a defensive game. Seldom does he tug the pellet but runs interference for his team-mates and blocks out opposing players. Farley is small weighing but 177 pounds but his weight is not a detriment to his playing. His work against Cagle of the Army eleven, was one of the outstanding features of the year. The diminutive Husker back got through many times to spoil the Army red-head's passes. He will be back next year to furnish competition for all bidders to a berth in the Nebraska backfield.



Blue Howell

CO-CAPTAIN AND FULLBACK

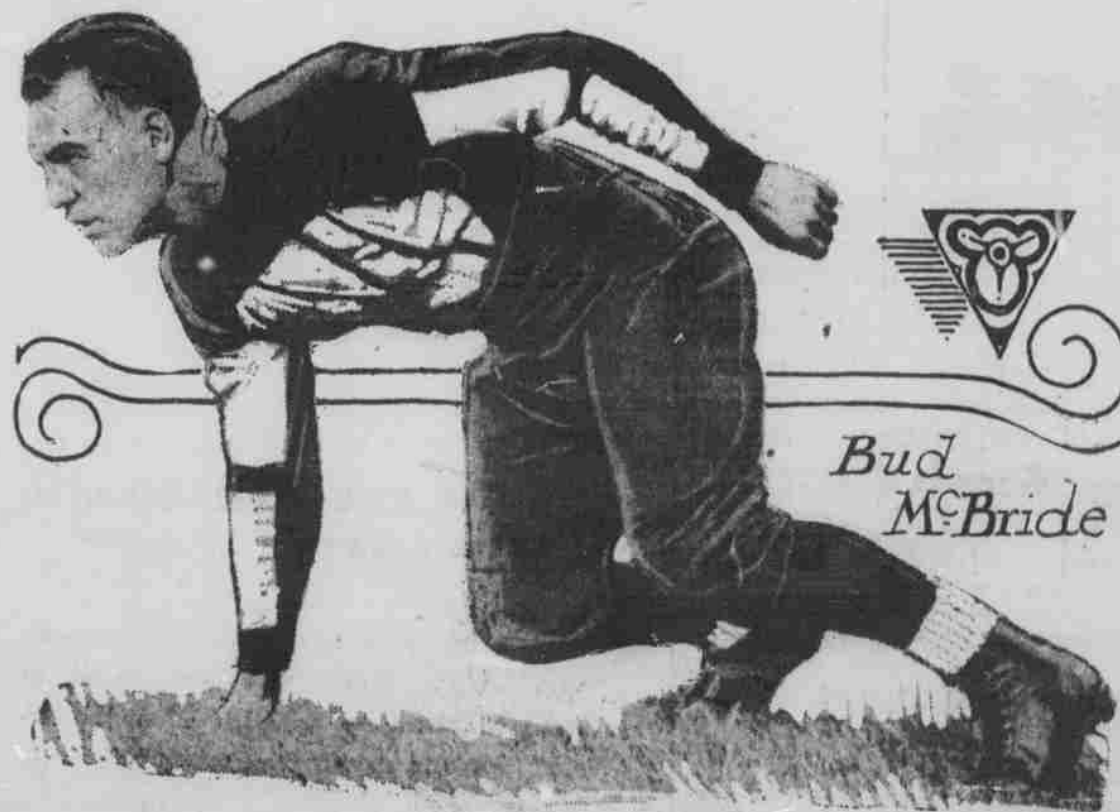
Blue Howell, co-captain of the 1928 Nebraska Cornhuskers and fullback of the team, Howell was considered one of the greatest fullbacks in the middle west. In the Big Six, Howell has no equal. His line plunging and line driving were the cause of many conference teams dropping into the defeated column and bringing the Big Six football championship to Nebraska. Howell started the Nebraska scoring in the Iowa State-Nebraska game when he scored all of Nebraska's points. This month Howell leaves for San Francisco to play with the All-Star eleven in a benefit game. His absence from the Cornhusker backfield will be keenly felt and he is the only back to graduate this spring.



Raymond Richards

ALL-BIG SIX TACKLE

Raymond Richards, 202-pound Cornhusker tackle and mainstay of the Nebraska line, is one of the few linemen that will be back next fall to help the Huskers win the second Big Six conference football title. Richards is a tower of strength in the Nebraska forward wall and was hindered this season by injuries early in the season but football fans predict a great year for the Husker tackle next season on the gridiron. "Rich" calls Pawnee City his home and has one more year of competition with Nebraska. He was mentioned on many of the All-Big Six elevens.



Bud McBride

RESERVE HALFBACK

Clark "Bud" McBride, one of the long list of Nebraska halfbacks, who will return next year to the football camp. McBride is another Lincoln high man and teams with "Dutch" Witte. Throughout the season, McBride would relieve Howell at the fullback position and his line driving tactics of this season insure that the Huskers will have a line driving back for the 1929 season that will be hard to stop. "Bud" weighs in at 163 pounds, one of the lightest backs on the squad, and is a junior this year. With two years of experience with the varsity, next year should find him in veteran condition for the 1929 season.



SOPHOMORE HALFBACK

Robert "Red" Young, sophomore halfback who made his debut this season on the Cornhusker eleven. Young is a century dash man and in the backfield he has an abundance of speed and drive. He is fast but fast. Next year should find the Husker red-head listed among the regular backs on the 1929 edition of the Husker eleven. Young hails from Norfolk and his weight is 143 pounds. He passed and carries the ball in a veteran manner and when he was sent into the fray down at Kansas, the Kansas fans thought he was some speed demon held back for the final thrust at the Kansas goal.
