Influenza Is Still Mystery

Influenza, more familiarly known to Americans as the "flu," is one disease that has successfully foiled all attempts of science to penetrate the mystery of its fundamental cause, according to Dr. R. E. Bu-chanan, head of the bacteriology department and dean of the graduate school at lowa State college. Contrary to general opinion, influenza has been recognized as a disease by physicians for many years and is not new, according to Dr. Buchanan. The first effort to attribute the cause of "flu" to bacteria was in 1889 when the disease made one of its periodic sweeps

of the world. Pollowing the epidemic of 1889, scientists falsely believed that the influenza bacteria had been suc-cessfully detected and isolated. Pfeiffer, a German bacteriologist, in 1892 described bacteria which he stated were the cause of in-fluenza. For twenty-six years bacteriologists labored under the impression that the germ had been

sweep of the disease in 1918, how-ever, Pfeiffer's bacteria were found to be unassociated with the cause

of the disease.

Science, therefore, is approximately in the same spot that it was twenty-six years ago in the battle with "flu," according to Dr. Buchanan. However, continual research is being done on the problem and a solution may be offered in the future, he believes.
