

None of last year's records were broken during last week's competi-tion in the annual R. O. T. C. track meet, according to Captain Lebman. The average was considerably lower in the two events held last week, the high jump and the 256 yard run, than last year.

pany averaged 535 points in this event. D company and H company were first in the two other events which have taken place during the last two weeks. D company was first in the high jump with an av-

erage of 399, and H company beat all other competition in the shotput with an average of 265 points. The competition in the companies has been very close and the fi-nal outcome of the meet is very doubtful, according to those in charge of the meet.
