#### Tigers Take Second

Missouri took second place in the conference with seven victories and three defeats, Oklahoma and Nebraska were the only two teams to turn in wins over Coach Edward's Tiger quintet. Coach Edwards had two basketballing aces in Welsh and Craig that accounted for a great amount of the Tiger scores during the season.

#### In third place was Nebraska with an even 500 percent.

The Huskers won five and lost five to beat out Iowa State for third place honors. The Huskers gave the league-leading Sooners a scare on the Coliseum floor at Nebraska when the two teams met for their last game in the conference, and were successful against the Tigers in their last meeting. The two Kansas quintets tied for last place honors, with two victories each. The once powerful Jayhawk team started out the season in defeat and could not get organized throughout the season.

#### Huskers inconsistent

Nebraska's work during the season was not consistent and when the Husker basketballers did find themselves, they flashed a brilliant brand of the court game. Coach Black changed his lineup several times during the year in an attempt to find a powerful five. Towards the close of the season he put a combination on the floor that had defensive power and a fast scoring machine.

#### Tommy Churchill of the Oklahoma Sooners is selected by The Daily Nebraskan for the first forward position on the All-Big Six quintet.

Churchill was the outstanding court man in the conference and led the scoring with a total of 124 points garnered in 10 Big Six games. His floor work was of the brilliant type and although his team mates continually fed him for baskets, his all-around work on the hardwoods, gave him the ace position in the conference.

#### Grace Performs Nobly

For Churchill's running mate, Craig of Missouri is selected. Craig's work in the scoring column ranked high and he placed third in individual honors with a total of 95 points. There was keen competition for the second forward position between Harvey Grace, leading scorer of Nebraska and Lande of Iowa State, the outstanding basketballer of the Cyclone five. Both men seemingly are equal.

## PLASTER MODELS ARE GIVEN TO ARCHITECTS

### Omaha Sculptors Present Engineering Division With Designs

Department of applied mechanical division of architectural engineering, has been presented with about twenty-five plaster models of ornamental sculpture, according to J. E. Smay, professor of the division of architectural engineering. These designs, in the form of bas-reliefs, vary in subject matter, and are used by sculptors as models from which the actual ornament is constructed.

They were presented as a gift to the department by the firm of Gioe and Mang, Omaha sculptors. The models are those which have actually been used in work, and the designers very generously offered to construct new ones for some that had been broken. It was through the courtesy of Davis and Wilson, Lincoln architects, that connection was made with the Omaha firm.

According to Professor Smay, these models are to be used for class study and exhibition purposes. Several will be kept in the top floor of the former Museum, and the others will be distributed in the engineering buildings on the campus.
