

TODAY'S GAME CLOSES SPRING GRID PRACTICE

Reds and Orange Will Play Fifth Game; May Bring Standing to Tie

SQUADS SHOW UP WELL

Only Thirty Points Scored So Far by Both Teams In Four Contests

Husker spring football will draw to a close today with a practice game between the Reds and Orange as the final event of a strenuous spring training period. This will be the fifth game between the two teams, the Reds winning once, the Orange twice and one game ending in a 6 to 6 deadlock.

The squad has been steadily improving since the workouts started and grid fans should be treated to a real exhibition of football this afternoon if they care to come to the Stadium. The games this year have been very close, only thirty points being scored by both teams in four games.

Monday and Tuesday nights Bibe had his men running through dummy scrimmage and polishing up on several plays that need attention. The attack is much more varied than is usually seen in the spring workouts here, passes being used a great deal. The passing game of the Huskers has improved a great deal and should give opposing teams something to worry about next fall.

Center Post Open

The two guards are also a question, with Justice, Gilbert, Koster, Greenberg and Schliefs putting up a strong fight. Dopesters Seek to Forecast Outcome Of Dual Meet With Oklahoma Sooners

Old man dope started working overtime Monday and Tuesday at the Memorial stadium dressing rooms, when members of the Scarlet and Cream varsity squad got together in quest of a dope sheet for the coming Oklahoma-Nebraska dual meet, scheduled for Saturday afternoon at the stadium track. Past performances of the two squads indicate a thrilling affair with a neck and neck finish in store for all local spiked shoe enthusiasts.

Coach Jacobs has assembled a well balanced squad at the Sooner institution and with the Big Six indoor title reposed within their hands and a dual undefeated standing that dates back for nearly five years, the Oklahoma mentor is leading extra efforts towards another diamond in their crown.

Churchill Leads Sooners
Chief among the Oklahoma performers is "Smiling Tom" Churchill, member of the 1928 Olympic team, Shelby, winner of the Kansas and Drake Relays high jump, Carman, hurdler, Bruce and Drake, pole vaulters, "Hippo" Howell, peer of the valley vaulters, Atkinson, sprinter and Flint, quarter miler.

Churchill will probably enter the track events along with Howell and being a very versatile individual should pick up several points. He has already won the Kansas game decathlon and placed second at the Penn Relays in the all-around events.

Will Push Carman
Carman is one of the leading timber tappers in Big Six circles and will attempt to further establish his reputation when he tackles with Lamson, Fleming, Thompson and Arganbright, Coach Schulte's mainstays. Past performances of the Scarlet and Cream hurdlers would indicate a long afternoon for Carman, though, with a close race on the card.

Bruce and Drake are two of the leading pole vaulters in this section. Bruce should recover from his injuries of the past two weeks, all three are due to soar to great heights. Shelby will have his own way in the high jump as he is capable of several inches above the six foot mark while Devard and Benbrook have both broken six feet.

Atkinson Stars in Big Six
Atkinson, who won the fifty yard dash at the Big Six indoor affair, has not had such great success in the longer distances but he is due to furnish some close running for Easter, Lowe, Eller and Nestor. Flint will carry the Jacob-coached representative color in the quarter-mile.

Coach Schulte put his sprinters through their paces Tuesday, covering the 75 yard and 175 yard distances. With the hope of cleaning up in the broad jump, the Husker broad jumpers were drawing special attention also.

Announcement of the entries for Nebraska will be made either today or Thursday.
