General Sessions Will Be Held at University on Friday, Saturday

ROOT IS FIRST SPEAKER

General program of the thirtieth annual meeting of the Nebraska Academy of Sciences, which will be held at the University of Nebraska this Friday and Saturday, includes three addresses to which the public is invited.

First of these will be "The Insularity of American History" by Dr. W. L. Root, chairman of the department of history, University of Iowa. He will give his lecture at 11 o'clock Friday morning in the auditorium of Social Sciences.

Miller Illustrates Lecture

Dr. Dayton C. Miller, professor at the Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland, Ohio, will give an illustrated lecture on "The Ether Drift Problem." Doctor Miller is one of the outstanding physicists of this country, according to Prof. W. C. Brenke, of the University of Nebraska and president of the Nebraska Academy of Sciences.
