Curator Collins Takes Imaginary Trip Abroad With Egyptian Mummy

F. G. Collins, assistant curator of the museum in Morrill hall, opened his regular Thursday morning radio talk broadcast from the university studio, by saying, "A question I often put to visitors to the Nebraska State Museum is what has interested you most of all? Children very often reply 'All of it.'"

It has all seemed wonderful to them, but from grown-ups I think the most general answer is "the mummies." The curator then went on to say that there were in the museum some mummies from South America and some from Egypt. Those from South America are bodies of Peruvian Indians, who hoped that by being buried in some particular spot outside the city of Cuzco they might secure everlasting life, and are to be found there in great numbers.

These mummies indicate that nothing much was spent on their burial, but due to the climate they are about as well preserved as the Egyptian mummies on which was spent large sums of money, preparing them for burial.

So he starts out to travel the nine thousand intervening miles, first reaching New York. Here his mummy companion pointed to the obelisk of red granite which stands in City Park, and asked, "What is that?" The curator went on to explain that it is one of the two obelisks which at one time stood at the entrance to the great temple of Helopolis in northern Egypt, one of the oldest of Egyptian temples.

From London the two travellers went to Rome, but had to leave there immediately because of the mummies seeing the obelisk which stands by the Pantheon there. Mr. Collins said, "The mummy did not know and I did not tell him how closely linked with Egypt was the history of Rome while he was lying dead in his grave at Thebes."

Julius Caesar, Rome's great general who had added Gaul and Britain to the Roman empire, and who failed so utterly over the lesser task of governing Egypt. The curator alluded to Caesar's downfall and also that of Mark Anthony at the hands of the Egyptian, Cleopatra.

From Rome he took the mummy to Alexandria, not daring to stop at Constantinople for fear the ancient Egyptian could not stand seeing more stolen obelisks outside the church of Saint Sophia. So they arrived at Cairo. "It was the museum at Cairo that killed my companion's desire to get back to Thebes. He was horrified to find that the museum contains as an exhibition for vulgar globe trotters some of the most sacred things of his race and country. The wretched sight of wealthy Americans and Englishmen digging like dogs among the Egyptian dead was the last straw."
