

# BIG SIX CONFERENCE KEEPS REGULATIONS

## Nebraska Announces Rules Important to Husker Student Body

The Big Six conference, of which Nebraska is a member, has rules and regulations with which many of the new students at Nebraska are not well acquainted. The following are published as the most important concerning Big Six athletes who compete in the conference.

1. Only men who have completed one full year (two semesters) may compete on any varsity team.
2. Only men who have passed twenty-seven hours (twenty-four in law school) in the last two semesters in school may compete.
3. A man on scholastic probation may not compete.
4. The dean of the school in which a man is enrolled may stop a man from competition at any time with one week's notice, for failure to keep up in current work.
5. Three years is the maximum competition permitted in varsity athletics. Competition in any contest in any sport counts as a year of participation. There is no distinction in this rule between conference and non-conference games.
6. A man must complete the semester's work in which he competes or be ineligible until he has again successfully passed twenty-seven hours of work that is, he loses his eligibility for a full year.
7. Participation in any institution in any intercollegiate game counts as a year and shall be deducted from his three years permitted.
8. Varsity teams may not compete against any high school, academy, or independent team. Neither may they scrimmage against them.
9. Participation on any team outside the university at any time is not permitted except that on application, permission may be granted for summer baseball or an amateur team or competition in an amateur meet such as swimming or track in summer vacation.
10. Only amateurs may compete. A man taking money for any athletic competition, for officiating in any athletic game for

pay or coaching any athletic team for pay loses his amateur standing.  
11. Freshmen are limited to athletic competition within the institution.  
12. No team or group of players except the regularly recognized varsity team may use the name of the University in any way.  
13. Freshman numerals will be awarded only to men who finish the semester in which they compete and pass in a minimum of twelve hours.  
14. Varsity awards may be denied men who leave school without satisfactory reason before the end of the semester in which the award is won or who fail to pass a majority percentage of their work in such semester.

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## DRILL ORGANIZATION WILL HOLD TRYOUTS

### Pershing Rifles Urge Men In Upper Classes to Enter Contest.

Tryouts for Pershing Rifles, honorary organization in the department of military science, will take place sometimes during the next two weeks. Incoming freshmen will be ineligible for tryouts, due to the ruling passed last year requiring men in university activities to have twenty-seven credit hours in this University. For this reason, upperclassmen are urged to try out in greater numbers than ever before.

Men are chosen for the organization on their ability with the manual of arms and their soldierly appearance and conduct. Pershing Rifles is a national society. Several new chapters have been recently installed, and more schools are petitioning for charters.

Officers of the group are planning a large number of activities for the coming year. Exhibition drills in Lincoln and possibly in other cities of the state will be held from time to time. The first time that the men will appear in public will be Armistice day, when the Pershing Rifles will head the R. O. T. C. unit in a parade.

Activities will not be entirely of a military nature, however. Plans are being made for either a fall or spring dance, and monthly dinners and smokers will be held. Officers of the organization for 1929-30 are: captain, Stanley Day; first lieutenant, Ben Cowdery; second lieutenant, Dick Deveraux; and first sergeant, Al Lucky.

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## Lewis Announces Cross Country Team Tryouts

Jimmie Lewis has issued his first call for the Husker cross country team. He wants all candidates to report to him at the stadium for the opening of the practice season. Lewis, who assists Coach Henry Schulte, will have charge of the cross country team at the opening of the season as Coach Schulte is at present out of town.  
Prospects for a winning cross country team during 1929 are very promising and Lewis stated that he expected a large number of men to report for the first session on the track.

## Whitney Does Research Work During Vacation

Dr. Davis Whitney, professor of zoology, has for the past summer been on the research staff of the Carnegie Institution at Cold Springs Harbor, L. I. His research is in experimental evolution with rotifers to learn of hereditary traits and determination of sex in higher life through the study of lower forms.

## AG STUDENTS PLAN TO WRITE NEWS FOR PUBLICATIONS

Three agricultural college students will do regular newswriting for daily and weekly newspapers this year according to an announcement from Prof. R. P. Crawford of the agricultural journalism department. They are Lily Danielson, Merlin Matzke, and George Round.

Miss Danielson has had one year of experience in writing on home economics subjects. She will furnish news copy for The Daily Nebraskan and other daily and weekly papers. Merlin Matzke and George Round will cover some student affairs and agricultural topics on the college of agriculture campus. Matzke is editor of the Cornhusker Countryman and Round is a new agricultural student who has had some experience in reporting for the Ord Quix of Ord, Neb.

Agricultural college students each year do writing and reporting for the news service which goes out regularly from the college. A few students work for pay. Some writing is required in the agricultural journalism courses as a requirement for college credit.

The Daily Nebraskan will have coverage of all agricultural college activities this year. A special arrangement has been made with students there to take care of all large affairs. The editors will make additional assignments of regular staff members on that campus. There will also be some material furnished by the various departments on experiments and

The summer term. Of those enrolled, 233 had received previous degrees at other institutions.  
Forty-five of the forty-nine instructors of the summer session agreed that the standard of work done and the attitude taken by summer students was superior to that of the regular students of the nine months term.  
Both instructors and students of the summer term voted in favor of a nine or a six to nine weeks term. There was still a strong sentiment among the students for two six weeks terms, however, according to Professor Moritz.

The ensemble, which will be composed of selected student musicians, will play principally for productions of the University Players, and will be strictly in the nature of a pit orchestra. A rehearsal class will be held in Morrill hall at hours which will be announced later, and one hour credit will be given for the course, Mr. Quick stated.

The course is to be known as Fine Arts 175. Musicians interested in joining the instrumental ensemble may arrange for tryouts with Director Quick.
