

# Sloan Runs Wild in Opening Scrimmage Session

**LONG SHOWS UP WELL**

Coach Dana Bible threw open the gates to Memorial stadium Saturday afternoon as more than two thousand football fans poured into the stadium to watch the 1929 Cornhuskers perform for the first time in scrimmage this season. Clair Sloan, veteran Husker back, together with Wally Marrow and Marvin Paul furnished the fans many an early season football thrill as they tore through the Nubbin team to roll up a total of 59 points against 6 for the second string varsity men.

The two sensational runs of the afternoon were furnished by Clair Sloan and Wally Marrow. In the opening minutes of the game Sloan took the pigskin on the kickoff and raced 85 yards to a touchdown. Late in the game Marrow clipped off 90 yards for another touchdown for the varsity eleven.

Touchdowns were scored by Sloan, Marrow, Peaker and Schwerstinger with Sloan crossing the white line three times for touchdowns and taking a fling at kicking the goals. No serious injuries marred the first scrimmage session and the coaching staff was well pleased with the showing made by the Scarlet and Cream squad. "Dutch" Witte, George Koester and Capt. George Farley carried minor injuries off the field while "Lou" Lewandowski is nursing a bad ankle and expects to be back in uniform Monday.

Nebraska's football mentor wasted no time Saturday in finding out what his various combina-

tions could do. Scrimmage began at 3 o'clock and continued until late in the evening. During the afternoon session "Buster" Long, who has been working with the Nubbins team, graduated to the first string of varsity regulars due to his work against the first squad. Long was one of the mainstays in the backfield for the team in orange jerseys.

The scrimmage session brought out the fact that Coach Bible is stressing the aerial game and fans will see a different type of football played at Nebraska this year. "Dutch" Witte, Sloan and Marrow handled a great share of the passing game and made a goodly number of their flips complete.

Marvin Paul, sophomore, played a flashy game in the Husker backfield during the afternoon and clipped off many a long run against the Nubbin team.

The only score for the Nubbin team came late in the afternoon when Steve Watkins intercepted a pass from Claude Rowley and ran 35 yards for a touchdown. Long's try for the extra point went wild.

Harold Frahm, backfield ace from the 1928 team, reported the stadium Saturday and expects to be back in training by Monday.

Coach Bible used several line-ups during the afternoon. The starting lineup was composed of Witte, Paul, Farley and Sloan in the backfield while Morgan, Richards, Koester, Maassen, Greenberg, Ray and Fisher made up the line. This combination was changed several times during the afternoon with Rhea and Bauer taking a fling at the center position in the line.

Coach Bill Day's Nubbin team was composed of Watkins, Carter, Tobin, Holt, Gartner, Hartnet, Dempsey, Long, Peltz, Nelson and

Peaker. Day used very few substitutions during the afternoon.

The stadium gates will be open again next week for football followers. Coach Bible having set aside Wednesday and Saturday for the public, the rest of the time to be spent in secret practice.

**FALL ELECTION FILLS  
VACANCY IN COUNCIL**

**Raikes Says Successor to  
Maxine Hill Will Be  
Elected Soon.**

One senior woman will be elected to the Student Council at the regular fall election on Oct. 8 to fill the vacancy left by the death of Maxine Hill, according to an announcement made by Ralph Raikes, president of the council. Saturday, Miss Hill was elected at the spring election of last year as the senior woman-at-large candidate. Her death follows an appendicitis operation this summer.

Raikes also announced a meeting of the Student Council Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the dramatic club rooms of the Temple.

ple. It will be the first meeting of the year.

Four class presidents are elected at the fall election. Election rules provide that an election shall be held the third Tuesday of each semester exclusive of registration week. That will put the fall election on Oct. 8.

The new member to fill the Student Council vacancy will be elected in the same way as at the spring election. Raikes will call for applications several days before the election. Any senior woman may file her candidacy for the position.

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
