Extension News Announces Conference: Creighton Man Will Lead.

The university Extension News announces the twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Nebraska conference for social work to be held in Lincoln Nov. 3-5.

The purpose of this association is to afford opportunities for discussion and consideration of questions pertaining to the mental, physical, ethical and social welfare of the people of this state. The meetings are open to all persons interested in any kind of social work.

Dr. H. von W. Schulte of Creighton university, Omaha, is president of the first district in which Lincoln is located. Dr. C. A. Pulmer is treasurer and C. E. Prevey, Dr. Hattie Plum Williams and Prof. A. A. Reed of Lincoln are members at large. Professor Reed is also executive secretary of this organization.

WOMEN'S HOCKEY PRACTICE GETS START MONDAY

All girls who have played or who are interested in playing hockey are asked to come out to practices which began Monday. The practice hours are daily at 5 o'clock and every hour on Wednesday except at 1 o'clock. Practices are to be held in the hockey field back of the Social Sciences building. Each girl is asked to try to get in at least two practices a week.

Hockey is to be the sport played during October and it will be played only during this month. During the first and second weeks, there will be general practices so that every body can get onto the technique of the game. During the third week, teams will be chosen and will practice together. In the fourth week of the month, the big tournament will be held with much competition between all the teams.

W. A. A. points will be given to those girls who come out faithfully to play hockey. Fifty points will be given for each game won in the preliminary round robin tournament. One hundred points go to the winners of the tournament and 50 points to the runners up. Five points will be given to each girl for each game of an intergroup tournament that she participates in.

Any girl who is taking physical education, and who needs a third hour credit on Wednesday may come out any hour hockey is offered on Wednesday with other day. Upper-classmen not enrolled in physical education for credit may play any of the above hours.

BOTANY FACULTY HAS CHANGES IN STAFF PERSONNEL

Two changes have been made in the department of botany staff this year. Dr. T. L. Steiger takes the place of Mr. Carl Rosenquist who is completing work for his doctorate at the University of Illinois, and Prof. A. E. Holch from Peru State Teachers college will replace Dr. W. E. Bruner who has become the head of the department of botany at Baker university. Dr. Steiger received his degree last June. He will assist Dr. R. J. Pool in general botany courses on the college of agriculture campus. Professor Holch has charge of certain courses in plant physiology and assists in general botany on the city campus.

Dr. Emma N. Anderson, assistant professor of botany, has just received copies of a bulletin containing the report of certain researches that have taken her attention for several years involving a study of the life history of certain unusual types of liverworts. Dr. Anderson's work has attracted much attention among the leaders of plant morphology in America. The report is published by the Botanical Gazette at the University of Chicago.

Orpheum—'Four Devils'

Even Coach Bible was surprised that the Scarlet backs did not use the aerial game any more than they did and he attributes it to the fact that the Husker backs were afraid of making a mistake.

Coach Bible stated once last season before he took over affairs in the camp of the Cornhuskers that if he could have two good quarterbacks he would be satisfied. The Cornhusker mentor sent all his quarterbacks into the game Saturday in the hopes that the Nebraska crew would take up the passing game but, typical of all Cornhusker football, straight football and pounded away at the Mustang line to roll up a total of more than two hundred yards.

Dame Rumor now has it around the Husker stronghold that Capt. George Farley will get a fling at the quarterback position in the inter-sectional classic on deck this Saturday with the Orange of Syracuse. Coach Bible was counting on "Dutch" Witte to take the helm of the Husker machine in the season opener last week but with the veteran back playing the bench and nursing an injured limb, Bible was forced to start Harold Peaker.
