

# HUSKERS PREPARE TO LEAVE LINCOLN

### Football Squad Will Pull Away From Rock Island Station on Wednesday Evening for Journey To Syracuse Orange Territory.

### NEBRASKA TAKES INJURY IN S. M. U. TILT

#### Claude Rowley, Star Back, Breaks Collar Bone in First Encounter of Season; National Dopesters Give New York Clan High Rating.

Wednesday evening Nebraska's Cornhusker football squad will pull away from the Rock Island station for the stronghold of the Syracuse Orange eleven in New York for its seventh encounter on the football gridiron. Nebraska came out of the Southern Methodist opening tilt with but one serious injury and that to Claude Rowley, veteran Husker back, who received a broken collar bone during his thirteen yard run through the Mustang eleven in Saturday's game. Coach Bible has but three days to whip his team into top shape for the big inter-sectional classic at Syracuse Saturday.

#### Have Training Advantage.

The handicap the Syracuse eleven will have over Nebraska is that they have played two practice games this season and Coach Andrews took his squad into training the last week in August. With the lead, Coach Bible and his men expect a tough assignment in this Saturday's game. Syracuse lost the great Hal Baysinger this year but has shifted its attack to a double wingback system and have a long string of veterans in suit. Much has been said this season on the double wingback formation and it has been used successfully by many outstanding eleven. Stanford was one of the early adopters in this style of play and it has been adopted by Coach Lee Andrews for his Syracuse Orange eleven.

With the first game on the 1929 state now history, Coach Dana Bible, the Cornhusker mentor, started out the week with a lengthy session in the training room and a like program on the field. Many rough edges shone out in the Saturday tilt and Bible and his staff hope to knock these off before the Scarlet lines up against Syracuse Saturday. One department which seemed to lack polish in the Mustang mix was the inability of the ends to get down on the punts and down the Texas ball toters.

In the Syracuse backfield are two veteran ball carriers—Sammy Sebo and Stevens. Both these Orange backs can be figured to do plenty of damage against Nebraska when the two elevens meet this week. Borton and Frank complete the Orange quartet. Frank being a first year man and Borton a reserve back from last year.

#### Council Is Inactive

When interviewed Monday as to his stand on the situation, Nelson, president of the Barb council, stated that the Barb council is not a political organization and does not officially back any political faction or ticket. He stated that no group of candidates had been selected or endorsed by the council.

"I am paying no attention to barb politics and do not know of any organization being done among the barbs," declared Nelson. "Whitford may have some kind of a party up his sleeve but if so I do not know anything about it."

"Not interested."

"I withdrew from politics because I am not interested in them. I do not intend to pledge a fraternity although I had several rushes last fall. I am not prejudiced against fraternities although I do think that the fraternity system at the university could be improved. I am for the barbs, not against the fraternities, if you understand what I mean."

Following is the statement signed by the barb leaders and presented to the Nebraska Monday: "We sincerely regret the withdrawal of Williams and the barb council from political activities, but we wish to call the attention of the student body to the fact that they are not the only barbs on the campus. We do not in any way disparage their ability as political leaders, but we feel that we can get along without them, if necessary. There will be a barb ticket this year."

### In the Valley

As a whole the teams in the Big Six conference did not fare so well Saturday in the opening day of the football season. Both Kansas elevens met teams from the Big Ten and both were defeated by large scores. Kansas bowing before Bob Zuppke's eleven and Coach "Bo" McMillin's K-Aggie eleven losing to Purdue. The Jayhawkers were decisively thrashed while the Aggies scored two touchdowns on the Purdue eleven. Ames Grinnell was unable to score on the Mustangs. The remainder of the Big Six teams were playing against their fresh. The football season is now well under way in the conference and from the dope on the first game it appears that Kansas will not be a formidable aggregation while the Kansas eleven from Manhattan look to be much stronger this year than last. Oklahoma and Missouri have not been in action yet and their power will be revealed this week when the Sooners entertain Creighton at Iowa State at Ames. The Mizou eleven should find it easy going against the Cyclones, although Coach Noel Workman is developing a fast backfield around the flashy Trauger, who is playing his second year at quarter for the Cyclone eleven. Nebraska, it seems, has the toughest assignment again this week when they journey to the eastern coast to meet the Syracuse Orange eleven.

This week the Cornhuskers pull away for the eastern coast for their second big game of the season. In meeting the Syracuse Orange eleven from Syracuse, N. Y., the Nebraska Cornhuskers are taking on one of the stiffest foes in the realm of football. Coach Lew Andreas has always put a strong eleven on the field and reports out of the eastern city are that Andreas is beginning his best year with the Orange footballers. Saturday they had little difficulty in tossing aside their opponent and are preparing to down the mighty Huskers from Nebraska. For the past two years, Syracuse and Nebraska have met on the gridiron at Lincoln and both times the Scarlet was successful. This year the Huskers hit the road and every time a Nebraska team takes to the road for one of those long journeys, Husker fans take a down-cast parting look at their football team as the last coach on the train pulls out of Lincoln. It was in 1917 that the Syracuse-Nebraska football rivalry began. That first game went to the Orange eleven and the 1918 game was a 3 to 0 affair for Nebraska. In 1922 and 1923 Syracuse was again successful, making the games now played at a tie—three up. The Huskers are playing it off this Saturday, the seventh game between the two schools, and Coach Bible is going to spend long hours of practice with his boys in scarlet in preparation for this eastern classic Saturday.

The Cornhusker pigskin tutor has just three days to get his Scarlet eleven in shape for the big inter-sectional battle in the east Saturday. The game Saturday was satisfactory considering the fact that it was a season opener but there are many places that the coaching staff are going to drive on the punts seemed to be the outstanding weakness against S. M. U. and this department stood out like a sore thumb because the Mustangs were well nigh perfect at this phase of the game. Coach Ed Weir was devoting a great amount of time to this department Monday night.

With the loss of Claude Rowley, who was injured in the Methodist game, Coach Bible will have to push to the limit to get his backfield in condition for the Syracuse eleven. Witt, Sloan and Rowley, three of the most outstanding backfield men on the bench, is enough to make any football coach wonder what he will do next. Sloan will probably be in shape to start against Syracuse Saturday although it is not definite as yet. Dr. Everett, team physician, stated that Rowley will not be able to get into action before the Sooner-Husker game on Nov. 16.

From the way "Bo" McMillin's K-Aggies played against Purdue Saturday, Big Six elevens are going to have their hands full this fall with the Manhattan tribe. Ray McMillin, nephew of Coach "Bo" McMillin, seems to be the main cog in the K-Aggie defense, and gave Purdue fans plenty of gridiron thrills in Saturday's fray with the Boiler-makers. Nebraska does not meet the Aggies until late in the season and on the Manhattan field. The last time the Huskers visited Manhattan they had a tough time the first half but the second half they got under way and rolled up a big lead. This year Coach Bible will take his Husker team to Manhattan for what probably will be one of the hardest conference games on tap.

### WOMEN'S TENNIS GAMES WILL BE HELD THIS WEEK

The game is to be played at Lawrence Jan. 6, 1930. Negotiations with Leoncio Ochoa, coach of the Mexican team, were completed today. The University of Mexico team was the national champion in 1928-29.
