

Biblemen Expect Tough Foe In Missouri Tigers

CRITICS POINT FOR HARD TIGER GAME

Coach Ossie Solem of Drake Claims Nebraska-Missouri Outcome Will Be Vastly Different Due to Reserve Cornhusker Strength.

MIZZOU STUDENTS BEGIN CAMPUS PEP RALLIES

Interest Runs High at Columbia as Coach Gwinn Henry Perfects Powerful Bengal Offensive to Stop Drive of Bible's Apostles.

"It will be different next Saturday when Missouri takes on Nebraska," said Coach Ossie Solem after his Drake Bulldogs had taken a 20 to 0 beating at the hands of the Missouri Tigers. "Nebraska has manpower and Coach Dana Bible will be able to match Missouri's reserves with Nebraska reserves and it should be a great game." The Des Moines football tutor believes the annual Tiger-Husker clash on the Columbia sod Saturday will be one of the greatest football classics offered in the middle west this year. Coach Dana Bible at the helm of the Scarlet squad had shown to sport critics throughout the country that the 1929 edition of the Nebraska eleven is developing into the great Cornhusker football team turned out at the western school.

Students at the University of Missouri started pep sessions on the Columbia campus Monday with the slogan, "keep the goal line uncrossed." The Tiger eleven has won its two games this season and rolled up a total of some fifty points while its two Iowa opponents have failed to score.

Reece Adds Power.

Coach Gwinn Henry, the Tiger mentor, started his Missouri eleven Monday to perfect its offensive play. But it is not only its offensive play that Henry is working on, for he is also keying his Tiger warriors up to a high point for this gridiron battle Saturday. He regards the Missouri-Nebraska game with utmost importance and its winning, he believes, will have a great deal to do with winning the conference. The injury list for Missouri after the Drake game amounted to nothing and the Tiger eleven is in the best of condition for the Nebraska Cornhuskers Saturday. Tiger followers are optimistic but not overconfident. They realize as well as the Mizzou coach that the Cornhuskers are going to be a difficult team to handle and the addition of Kern Reece to the Missouri lineup strengthens the eleven considerably.

Out in Memorial stadium Coach Dana X. Bible, the master of destinies for Cornhusker football, is drilling his Scarlet squad night after night in preparation for this coming game with the Tigers. It is the all important game of the 1929 schedule in the Big Six. To win the opening conference game with Missouri is a good indication as to where the football power of the conference is sheltered. Bible is not concerned any more with inter-sectional battles. His slate of east-west and southern games is now history and he is throwing everything into the battle for the five game conference series that lies just ahead. Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, K-Aggies and Iowa State is the lineup that will greet Coach Bible until the close of the season on Memorial stadium sod Thanksgiving day.

Monday and Tuesday evening Coach Bible drilled his Scarlet pigskin warriors on both defensive and offensive work. The fresh were given the south end of the sod and the Nubbins team the north end and after running a few plays against the fresh, they moved up to the other end and went on defense against Tiger plays. Coach Charley Black, who scouted the Tiger eleven in its Iowa invasion, states that Henry has a well polished football machine with an offensive attack that is well varied in running attack and aerial work.

Few Minor Injuries. The injury toll from the Pitt game was not exceptionally heavy in the camp of the Cornhuskers, with Lewandowski getting the toughest when he broke two fingers in the game. Dutch Koster and Hugh Rhea were suffering from lime burns while Sloan, Witte and Richards came through the game in good shape. Scheringer, halfback, who was injured in the Syracuse game is still gracing the injury column but is expected back in shape for Missouri.

Coach Bible expects to spend this week in building up plenty of reserve material in his backfield and has made one change since the Pitt game. Red Young has been moved into the A backfield in place of Harold Frahm, the Beatrice back. Young was working with Farley, Sloan and Witte in the session on the sod Tuesday night.

Coach "Bunny" Oakes forward wall is also due for some shaking up and revamping. Cliff Morgan,

The Husker who carried across the only score in the Pitt game Saturday seems to be the logical man for that position while the other terminal of the Husker forward wall is in the sifting process, Steve Hokuf who has just overcome scholastic difficulties which have kept him on the sidelines during the first quarter, is getting the call for the other wing position. Hokuf is one of the finest built wingmen in the camp of the Cornhuskers. Weighing 190 pounds and fast, the Crete athlete may see plenty of service the remainder of the season.

Richards, the iron man in the forward wall, is back at his old position and hoping he will get a break the rest of the season and stay as clear of the injury column as he possibly can. Marion Broadstone is working at the other tackle with Elmer Greenberg and Dutch Koster holding down the two guard berths. The center position seemed to be the one weakness against "Tommy" Parkinson Saturday and the big back found little difficulty in going through the center of the Nebraska line. Hugh Rhea, Harvey Bauer and Morrison are the other centers in the Cornhusker line but all are more or less inexperienced in varsity circles.

Coach "Bunny" Oakes is devoting the entire week of practice before the Tiger game in building up his reserve line to match against the reserves of Coach Gwinn Henry.
