DELTA SIGNS TOP LIST OF GRECIAN HARRIERS

Winners Score Heavily in Thursday Running to Increase Lead

Delta Sigma Lambda's fleet harriers maintained their post at the top of the standings in the interfraternity race and found race as the latest event was run this week. The team not only kept its place at the head of the list, but collected 373 points in the race, 69 more than its nearest rival, Tau Kappa Epsilon, whose total was 304.

Other fraternities which scored in the race, together with the number of points they gained, are: Theta Xi, 187; Farm House, 165; Theta Chi, 93; Alpha Sigma Chi, 92; Sigma Phi Epsilon, 67; Delta Tau Delta, 45; Delta Chi, 27; Kappa Sigma, 25; and Delta Sigma Phi, 1.

Delta Sigma Lambda's total of points in the three races is 1,090. Others above 200 are: Tau Kappa Epsilon, 687; Farm House, 427; Theta Xi, 384; Alpha Sigma Chi, 318, and Delta Tau Delta, 204. Fourth race will be run next Thursday.

FOOTBALL CRITIC PLACES WEIR ON TEN YEAR TEAM

The forward pass has zoomed a new era of football into the sports world, asserts George Trevor, noted pigskin authority, in the current issue of Liberty magazine.

In choosing a mythical all-American team which represents a roll call of gridiron greatness from 1919 to 1929, the span of the new period, Mr. Trevor has chosen Weir, of Nebraska, for the position of tackle on his outfit.

Writing of Nebraska's famous grid star, Mr. Trevor says: "Weir, Nebraska's lancing tackle, treads close on the heels of West and Henry. 'Boze' Mistehead, who transferred from Wabash to Yale, wrought terrific havoc but was apt to charge blindly and leave his position open to a counter-thrust." This weakness eliminated Weir's competitor from Mr. Trevor's team.

"The modern decade, embraced by this mythical outfit, represents a cycle coinciding with the rise of the Far West and Deep South to a position challenging the time honored football supremacy of the East and Midwest," continues Mr. Trevor. "The present era is one of 'gridiron basketball'—the sky darkened with flying pigskins; forward passes, flat or deep, thrown on every other down; wide sweep runs behind cloud interference; deceptive crisscrosses, cut-backs and delayed 'spinners'; lateral passes; tricky variations of the Minnesota shift designed to dislocate the defense; far flung 'spreads'; 'Stunt' of Liberty fakes; hidden ball maneuvers performed by thimble rigging conjurers; and that old reliable, the off-tackle power drive.

"Kicking is soft pedaled in this modern game. Attack has overcome the long established ascendancy of defense. Touchdowns come cheaper than field goals. Realizing these radical changes you can understand why it is not feasible to compare past war heroes with the Hestons, McClungs, Eckersalls, Cowans, Newells, Kings, Schultzes, Coys, Thorpes, and Mahans of yesteryear."
